

Canadian Recording Artists

Canada Post issued a set of four stamps featuring four *living* Canadian Recording Artists on June 29, 2007 (Gordon Lightfoot, Joni Mitchell, Anne Murray, Paul Anka). All four have received the Order of Canada, a requirement in honouring living individuals on a postage stamp.

The stamps were released in similar formats to last year's Legends of Hollywood stamps:

- self-adhesive booklet panes of 8 stamps with four different booklet covers, one for each artist
- water-activated gum souvenir sheet of 4
- prepaid postal cards
- Canada Post's *Details* magazine appeared with four different covers, one for each artist

The souvenir sheet and booklets are shaped like a record (remember those?).

Flower Booklet Reprints

All three of the current Flower booklets have been reprinted. The \$1.10 booklet reprint seems to be the last to make its appearance in post offices across the country.

52¢ Definitive Booklet Reprints

On the Flag booklet of 30 reprint the UPC barcode has been moved to make it more convenient for scanning. The original booklet had the barcode *inside* the booklet which required it to be opened in order to be scanned (quite a nuisance).

I was in Ottawa in the middle of June and had the opportunity to visit the National Archives of Canada and peruse a few items of philatelic interest. Many thanks to new ESG member Pascal Leblond, who works at the Archives, for helping to arrange for material to view. Without his help I may not have seen the material I was able to look at. Thanks also to ESG member Leopold Beaudet for joining me during the visit (he was viewing different philatelic material).


Of the material that I requested, I was able to view the following: 50¢ Flag booklet press sheets, 50¢ Queen booklet press sheets, Traditional Trades press sheets. If you recall, the 50¢ definitive booklets were the ones that had different advertising on the covers. In the case of the Queen booklet there were 5 different ads; in the case of the Flag booklets there were some 25 different covers to hunt down. While these were current, various cutting varieties were found; there was always a question by collectors as to the makeup of the press sheets.

It turns out that in both cases (Flag and Queen), the Canadian Bank Note Co. used two different plate arrangements depending on the type of paper (TRC vs Fasson) used. I took various notes and measurements and upon my return home created a mockup of the sheets using Adobe Photoshop. I scanned booklets and duplicated and placed them as needed. As such, the illustrations may not show exact alignment where the different panes meet (particularly on the advertising side). The results of the 50¢ Flag booklet press sheet illustrations can be seen starting on page 10 of this issue. I have *not* noted all of the different colour bars that appear on various edges of the sheets.

With this year's dues renewal included in the last issue of *Corgi Times* I included a membership survey. To date some 53 members have returned a completed survey; this is out of 130 renewal notices (with 23 members still not yet renewed). Why the difference of 54? Here are some of the survey results (we will give responses to other questions in the next issue):

Q1. What could be done to improve the quality of the Corgi Times?

No basic domestic letter rate increase in 2008

Ottawa - Canada Post Corporation today announced that there will be no increase in the domestic basic letter rate in 2008.

Under the price-cap formula approved by the federal government in 2000, basic letter rate increases, when warranted, will not exceed 66.67 per cent of inflation as measured by the Consumer Price Index from May prior to the last increase to May of the current year. Increases will be implemented no more than once a year, in January, and announced no later than July 1 in the year before the increase goes into effect in the Canada Gazette Part I.

The Consumer Price Index from May 2006 to May 2007 shows an increase of 2.2 per cent negating an increase in the domestic letter rate next year. Price changes for the remaining regulated domestic Lettermail and USA and International letter-post products continue to be market-based and proposed increases are scheduled for implementation on January 14, 2008.

Canada Post announced in the Canada Gazette Part 1 the following proposed rate adjustments.

- \$0.03 increase to \$0.96 for letters, cards and postcards up to 30g destined for the USA;
- \$0.05 increase to \$1.60 for letters, cards and postcards up to 30g to foreign destinations.

Canada Post's proposed rates for a 30-gram letter to the USA and other International destinations compare favourably to the rates other countries charge to send a similar piece of mail to Canada. It costs \$2.64 from Great Britain, \$3.05 from Germany and \$1.80 from Australia to send a 30-gram letter to Canada. The cost to mail a 30-gram letter from the USA to Canada is \$1.15.

Annual price increases are consistent with industry practice and are necessary for Canada Post to retain a competitive position in an ever-changing marketplace. Rate adjustments are necessary to keep pace with inflation, direct operating costs and the need to reinvest in network infrastructure to meet customer demands. Fuel costs, for example, rose 6 per cent in 2006 and are expected to remain high.

Canada Post is facing inflationary pressure from a number of sources. One such source is terminal dues, a pricing mechanism that allows the postal administration receiving mail for delivery to collect for the cost of delivery from the postal administration sending the mail (in this case Canada Post). It is expected that terminal dues to the United States will increase by a minimum of 5 per cent in 2007, while dues to other international destinations will increase by 2.5 per cent.

Detailed information on these and other proposed rate changes is available in the Canada Gazette Part 1. Canadians have 60 days in which to make representations to the Minister Responsible for Canada Post regarding the proposed rate increases.

Captain George Vancouver

Canada Post release a \$1.55 stamp on June 22, 2007 honouring Captain George Vancouver. This is the first time the honoured individual has not has his/ her face shown on the stamp ... because no known image has been recorded of Vancouver.

As illustrated, the single stamp was issued in a pane of 8 and a souvenir sheet of 1.

The stamp from the souvenir sheet (perf 13.1) is a different perforation from those in the pane of 8 (perf 13.1 x 12.5).



Aniline Blue Ink Variations are Not Real Errors

Don't pay any premium for these other than as a curisotiy by John Jamieson – December 27, 2004



There are a number of "blue" stamps from the 1960's that appear from time to time with what appears to be "analine" ink ... the blue is much darker than normal and appear transparent from the gum side with the design showing clearly on the reverse. These are *NOT printing varieties* but are caused by exposure to certain chemicals. We fell the big culprit is chemical softeners used in early plastic pages made to store plate blocks and paper money manufactured in the 1950's through 1960's. We have seen collections housed in this type of album page where *all* the "blue" stamps of the 1950's and 1960's show this change (and there are no normal ones) ... an impossible coincidence.

The stamps shown are examples of what these appear like. We have seen these on Scott number 393, 405, 435, 444, 445, 449, and 473 and there is little doubt a few others may exist affected by these chemicals.

We reference a letter written on February 9, 1979 by James E. Kraemer, then Manager of the National Postal Museum, to an unknown party explaining that these are not a variety. The individual had sent Mr. Kraemer a total of 31 copies of 5 different stamps for opinion and he, in turn, had submitted them to the Canadian Bank Note Company in Ottawa, the printers of the stamps, for their opinion. The printer's chemist advised that Analine ink was never used in any of these printings and he felt they had all been chemically altered. This letter also mentions the "plasticizers" in some early plastic envelopes as being one cause of the change.


SO ... beware and don't pay any premium for these other than as a curiosity. We have seen these offered on various auctions and other dealer pricelists at substantial premiums, which they most certainly do not deserve.

\$5 Moose Colour Shift

Thanks to ESG member Rick Penko we can pass along this fascinating scan of a stunning colour shift on the \$5 Moose stamp (Sc. 1701).

The engraved colours have been shifted vertically (and at a bit of an angle), exposing some horizontal lines at the lower right corner of the pane. The shift is about 15mm at the left and nearly 20mm at the right.

Rick notes that only the one pane has been reported.

Year of the Pig "Pork Prices Hitting Rock Bottom"

The latest *Canadian Stamp News* contains a HALF PAGE advertisement from Alliance Coin & Banknote of Almonte, ON.

They are selling full panes of the missing colour errors at 1,495 — that is not a misprint. That would equal \$59.80 per stamp.

When these errors first appeared the selling price was \$995 per stamp; this was followed by a drop to \$395 per single (as we reported in the March–April 2007 Corgi Times).


By the way, be careful with these errors; fakes have shown up on eBay - just what you wanted to hear.


Unitrade 2008 Edition





Sc. 2080a, 50¢ Flag Booklet Canadian Bank Note Co., TRC paper, 48 panes per sheet



Unknown Misperforated Stamps Offered for Sale by R. Maresh & Son

Introduction

Maresch & Son offered a few unknown misperforated stamps in its auction Sale of June 21, 2007. The misperforated stamps are interesting for several reasons: the stamps were not from regular sheets - they were from booklet panes, coils and souvenir sheets; the stamps that were misperforated resulted in stamps of unusual size from the booklet; and the stamps from the coil resulted in stamps with their value at the top instead of the bottom.

The auction was in Toronto on Maresch's premises at Yonge and Finch. I was in Toronto in June and for the first time I actually went for the first day of this auction. Much to my surprise, the auction was well attended and I had to stand for several hours before I got a seat.

Description of the Stamps and Misperforation

\$1.35-cents Homer Watson Souvenir Sheet:

The Homer Watson souvenir sheet is part of the 'Art Canada' series of stamps issued each year. It was issued on May 27, 2005 in two formats: pane (16 x50c stamps) and souvenir sheet with two stamps (1x50c stamp and 1x85c stamp). The stamps were designed by Hélène L'Hereaux and printed by Lowe-Martin in 8-colour lithography on Tullis Russell Coatings Paper. The stamps are general tagged on four sides. The perforation of the stamps are 13+ and the gum used was PVA. The dimension of the souvenir sheet is 150mm x 86mm (horizontal). Homer Ransford Watson was one of the most prominent artists in his day. He was born in Kitchener, Ontario on January 14, 1885. Katherine Hale of the Canadian Magazine writes the following of him "Laureate-like he is a poet of the trees, and he has loved them, lived with them, learned of them all his life, until from intimacy has grown tremendous power." Notable collectors owned his paintings including Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

The misperforated Homer Watson souvenir sheet was offered for sale by Maresch & Son in its auction of June 21, 2007. The misperforated error was described as follows in lot 2811:

**2100 Var: \$1.35 Homer Watson souvenir sheet with PERFORATION SHIFTED DOWN, n.h. and very fine Est. 150+

This misperf is horizontal as the perforation is shifted down. Since no photograph of this error was shown in the catalogue, the extent of the misperforation shift is not known. If the misperforation is more than 3-4 mm it is likely that the stamps are also mistagged i.e., the tagging at the top is missing.

45-cents Flag Stamp:

The Maple Leaf flag has been accepted as the leading Canadian symbol long before Confederation, displacing the previously popular Beaver. The Flag stamps were initially printed by Leigh Mardon Pty Ltd. and later by Canadian Bank Note. and Ashton-Potter Canada Limited. The multicolour stamps were designed by Gottschalk + Ash International on coated paper. They appeared in three formats: pane of 10; pane of 25; and pane of 30. These flag stamps were printed in two sizes. The stamps printed initially were larger than the stamps printed later. The small size stamps were printed by Canadian Bank Note and Ashton-Potter Canada Limited. The misperforated stamps which were offered for sale were on the small size stamps. The misperforated pane of ten was from non-inscripted or local post office panes (i.e., without the inscription at the right of the pane). A misperforated pane that is similar but not as pronounced is known to exist on BK 177A i.e., from booklet panes of 25 stamps (stamps that are larger).

The misperforated Flag booklet pane was offered for sale by Maresch & Son in its auction of June 21, 2007. The misperforated error was described as follows in lot 2788:

The above misperfs is from booklet - BK 205 - 10x45c- and is shifted downwards by 14mm. The horizontal perforations that are shifted

down pass below the inscription 'CANADA 45' and through the flag of the stamps in the second row cutting the bottom of the flag but above the stem. The bottom row has no inscription making it quite interesting as it has no name of the country or the value.

This misperforated error is instructive as far as the tagging is concerned if in the normal position. It creates various types of horizontal tagging errors: the top row of stamps with the horizontal tagging is 5mm instead of a 2.5mm and it appears in

the middle of the long stamp creating what appears as a G2dH tagging error; and the bottom row whose stamps are less than half the normal size has the tagging missing at the top resulting in a G2aB tagging error.

\$1.40 Maple Leaf Coil Stamp:

The Maple Leaf appeared on Canadian stamps as early as 1897 in the bottom corners of the stamp. This is hardly surprising as it has been an emblem of Canada long before it appeared as a centerpiece on Canadian stamps. According to Canada Post "...It may have been used to represent this country as early as 1700." The new \$1.40 maple leaf coil stamp (in rolls of 50) was designed by Monique Dufour and Sophie Lafortune. This stamp was initially printed by Ashton Potter Limited using lithography in three colours (Green, Brown, and Beige) on Tullis Russell Coatings Paper and is tagged on four sides. It has the denomination shown on the bottom left with the name of the country on the right and was issued on December 19, 2003. The initial print had simulated perforation at the sides of the stamp. In the fall of 2004, reprints of these three coil stamps were issued but this time it was printed by Lowe Martin. The \$1.40 reprints have simulated perforation at the top and bottom unlike the initial print in contrast to the initial print estamps.

The misperforated new Maple Leaf coil stamp was offered for sale by Maresch & Son in its auction of June 21, 2007. The misperforated error was described as follows in lot 2810:

**2010 Var: \$1.40 Maple Leaf wavy line die cut self-adhesive COIL strip of 4, MISCUT THROUGH BRANCH ABOVE VALUE (putting denomination on stamp below), most interesting Est. 150+

This misperf is horizontal. The perforation is shifted up by 6mm touching the bottom of the leaf as a result the value and name of the country are cut off at the bottom and appear at the top of the stamp. If the tagging is as on the normal stamps, the misperf would result in a tagging error i.e., a G2dH tagging error. In other words, the tagging at the top and bottom of the stamp would be missing and would appear as a thick bar near the middle of the stamp.

Concluding Remarks

Misperforated stamps are interesting errors even though they are not listed in most major catalogues as they create unique designs. Misperforation also results in stamps with unusual tagging errors. They can also be educational if they provide information about the printing process that is not usually made known by the Post Office. Prices for them can vary depending on the extent to which the perforation are shifted and whether they create unique designs, holding the number of misperforated stamps constant.



Letters from Home

I am writing this in mid April, having just returned from a weekend with the Inland Empire Philatelic Society at Moses Lake Washington, where I put on one of five presentations on the Saturday.

Part of my presentation was a little bit about my mother's correspondence with me over a

forty year period. I mentioned in my presentation just how scarce I thought Elizabethan postal history is becoming.

One member of the audience mentioned to me he collected "Bridges", he said, "the stamps are fairly easy, but you know, it's darn hard to find bridge stamps on cover"!

Well that got me to thinking (not an easy accomplishment now that I'm retired) and so I searched my correspondence from home and found my mom had done me well and I had four covers all using the "Confederation Bridge" commemorative.

The Federation Bridge connecting New Brunswick with Prince Edward Island was commemorated with a pair of stamps (Canada Specialized no. 1645 and 1646) on May 31, 1997. This lithographed pair of stamps was printed in a pane of 20 stamps with 10 tabs separating the stamps. Shown in figure 1 is a pair of the stamps.

Figure 2 shows an oversized envelope with a pair of the stamps with the tab between, the

pair pays 90¢ of the \$1.17 rate for an oversized envelope to the USA weighing up to 100gr. The remainder of the rate ids made up of a block of five of the 5¢ and a single 2¢ edible berry definitive stamps.-Mailed from Vancouver on or about June 7, 1997 (the date is not readable on the cancellation) but I noted on the back of the envelope that I received it on June 17, 1997. Ten days was approximately the delivery time I was experiencing in those days.

Figure 3 is an oversized envelope with a single Confederation Bridge stamp with the tab attached. This envelope was mailed at the USA rate of 52¢ with the short paid portion made up of a single 5¢ and 2¢ edible berry definitive stamps.

Once again I was gratified to hear someone else complain of their inability to get Canadian Commemorative stamps used postally correctly in period.

I challenge you to watch your mail for a week and count how many envelopes (non philatelic) you receive with commemorative stamps affixed. If you get one I will be surprised!
