Postage Rate Increase?

The latest issue of *Canadian Stamp News* (Aug 4, 2009) reports on the front page that Canada Post submitted a regulatory proposal, published in the June 27 issue of the *Canada Gazette*, to raise the basic domestic letter rate by 3¢ to 57¢ in January 2010.




If this rate increase occurs, it will be the largest increase in the domestic letter rate since 1982 when the rate jumped from 17¢ to 30¢.

2010 Unitrade

The 2010 edition of the *Unitrade Specialized Catalogue of Canadian Stamps* has been completed and sent to the printer. It should be at your local dealer by the end of September. The price remains the same as the previous several years, \$42.95.

The new stamp issues for 2009 required 10 pages! The Introduction has been expanded to include information about Lowe-Martin's self-adhesive coils. The five United Nations stamps issued for use at the UN Pavilion at Expo '67 in Montreal have been added to the "back of the book". These stamps were issued in Canadian denominations and were valid for postage only on mail posted at the UN Pavilion during the fair.



Her Majesty's Stamps

The Canadian Museum of Civilization in Gatineau, QC (across from Ottawa, ON) is showing an exhibition from June 19, 2009 to January 3, 2010 of a portion of the personal collection of Queen Elizabeth II.

"Her Majesty's Stamps explores the history of postal reform in Great Britain, which led to the introduction of the postage stamp in 1840. This important innovation, which revolutionized the world of written communication, was eventually adopted in Canada and around the globe. This exhibition features a selection of extraordinary material from the Royal Philatelic Collection, including colour and obliteration trials from the world's first stamps, early stamp designs, original artwork, archival documents as well as unique Canadian philatelic gems that reveal fascinating facts in Canadian postal history."

Canada Post News

Do we like more stamps being issued by Canada? Sure we do! Every new issue is a part of the Elizabethan era - right up our alley. Here is what Canada Post is up to these days...

▶ Lowe-Martin Die Cutting Pattern # 13

The last issue of *Corgi Times* (May–June 2009) featured an article that "plated" the twelve known die cutting mats used by Lowe-Martin on the self-adhesive coils that have been printed since 2004.

The current Permanent™ Olympic rolls of 100 with setenant emblem designs have been issued with a new die cutting mat, bringing to 13 the number of mats seen over the years. Boxes dated Apr 9 2009 (or later) should have this new die cutting.



There is a significant difference between this original printings of these coils and the new release — the original release (die cutting mat 12), illustrated at left, had **four** "paper nibs" between each stamp. The new die cutting mat (#13), illustrated at right has **three** "nibs" between each stamp.

Non-Transmissible

Illustrated is an airmail letter postmarked: Gander, Nfld., Nov. 9, 1959. The sender intended it to go to England, but instead it was back-stamped at the Undeliverable Mail Office in Ottawa 4 days later, and then marked Non-transmissible, before being returned to him.



From the Canada Official Postal Guide, 1955 edition, pp 97-98: Domestic Mails, Prohibited Articles, section 350 - Lotteries:

"Persuant to the above authority the Postmaster General has made the following regulations, viz: -

- 1. letters, circulars or other articles concerning illegal lotteries, so-called gift concerts or other illegal enterprises of like character offering prizes shall not be deemed mailable matter;
- 2. mailable matter suspected to concern illegal lotteries, so-called gift concerts or other illegal enterprises of like character offering prizes shall be intercepted and sent specially by first class mail to the Administration Branch (for Undeliverable Mail Office), Ottawa, where upon being satisfied that there are grounds for such suspicion they shall mark on the covering of such mailable matter "non-transmissible" and return to the sender, otherwise they shall cause it to be forwarded to the addressee."

This was before the Montreal Olympics, and the expediency of the "voluntary tax". How times have changed!



Postage Due to Canada Prior to 1966

In the QE period prior to Jan.1, 1966, if a piece of foreign mail to Canada was short paid, it was handled in one of two ways. Mail from the USA had an amount due in US cents, and this was simply collected at par. Short paid mail from the rest of the world had a 'T' with an amount beside it in gold francs and centimes, which the Exchange post office in Canada converted to Canadian cents at the rate of 3 centimes = 1 Canadian cent. That was the theory.

Shown is an airmail postcard from Nice France to Belleville, Ontario, mailed August 4,1956. It is a comedy of errors.



The sender paid 35F, made up of 12F for the special "Frontier" rate to Canada for cards (enjoyed since 1937) + 23F for airmail to North America. However, the French Post Office treated it like a card to the USA, which required the 18F UPU rate + 23F for airmail. The supposed deficiency of 6F was doubled to 12F, then converted to gold centimes. 12F = 17 gold centimes or 0.17.

At the Canadian exchange office the 0.17 was read as 0.12, converted to 4 cents due, and marked for collection.

As noted under the due stamps, there was no one home when delivery and collection were attempted, so a form 26 notice card was left instead. To obtain his correctly franked card Mr. Hunt was forced to make a trip to the Post Office and pay the postage due, getting the stamps postmarked in the process.

New Envelope Printing Date

Robert Lemire has passed along a new printing date on the size 10 Gardens/Orchids envelopes that were seen earlier this year: 04.04.09. The original release were dated 01.19.09.


The printing dates are found on the back of the envelopes and make for an interesting speciality sideline.




Gardens (4 designs)





Plating Quarterly Pack Booklet Singles



Canada Post's quarterly packs, at least for the last several years, have included regularly included unique die cutting varieties of self-adhesive stamps. This is where you can obtain the self-adhesive stamp die cut entirely through the cover/backing paper.

What if you tried to take these die cutting varieties to the "next level"? The "next level" is attempting to find all of the unique positional pieces of self-adhesive booklet 'covers'/backing paper.

Let us take a closer look at the 2008/01 quarterly pack. In addition to four Flower coils, it contains the following self-adhesive issues:

The table below includes three different counts: the number of possible different positional pieces that should be available/collected for that issue; (the other two columns will be discussed below). Is it possible to purchase *multiple* quarterly packs from the *same* post office outlet and get a *random* selection of stamps in the hope of plating *each* positional piece? Or does one need to purchase packs from *different* post offices in *different* geographic locations?

I recently had the opportunity to study thirty-five (35) complete packs of the 2008/01 quarterly pack that were all purchased from the same post office outlet in Winnipeg, MB. Let us see how successful I was in obtaining all positional pieces for each of these six issues.


The second column in the table above notes the number of different positional pieces found in the 35 quarterly packs purchased at ONE location. The results vary considerably from one issue to another. In the illustrations that follow, numbers in green summarize the positional counts obtained from these 35 quarterly packs

The last column in the table above shows the number of different positional pieces that I have been able to gather from a total of 11 quarterly packs purchased from several (number not known) different post offices at different times. In the illustrations that follow, numbers in red summarize the positional counts obtained from these 11 quarterly packs.

Observations

- * Even though we looked through 46 different quarterly packs, it was still not possible to complete all of the different positions from all six booklets. That is a bit of a surprise. One would have thought the odds would have been in our favour to complete the task.
- * It would appear that it is better to purchase less packs from an individual post office and *spread out* your purchases from multiple post offices rather than putting "all your eggs in one basket". Our purchase of 35 packs from the *same* outlet essentially gave us less completeness. Again, I would have hoped that "quantity" should have given us better results.
- * Spending some \$863.64 (46 packs x \$17.86 + GST) still did not give us completeness! Wow. As ESG member Andrew Chung would say, "thanks for contributing to my pension plan." You're welcome.

Surprise!

Perhaps the biggest surprise in this exercise is that regarding the Flag over Lighthouses booklet (BK364). The number of positions for completeness with this booklet was anticipated to be just two. Yet, out of 46 quarterly packs, all 46 strips of 5 se-tenant stamps were from the exact same position. This leads to at least four possibilities:

- * only one strip (of two) was cut from the booklet and the other half discarded
- * both strips were cut from the booklet but only one was used in the quarterly packs and the other one discarded
- * both strips were cut from the booklet and I am so unlucky that I have yet to find a post office that has a quarterly pack containing the 'other' strip
- * only one strip (of two) was purposely removed (similar to the 5 alternating stamps from the QE II booklet) because it is not possible for the cutting equipment to remove so much "material" from the booklet

I'm betting on the last possibility; the "missing" strip from the Flag booklet and missing stamps from the QE II booklet simply do not exist in quarterly packs.


The one 2008 Annual Collection that I have happens to have the same strip as found in the quarterly packs.

Canada's Elizabethan Era Stamp Count

Many novice stamp collectors likely start collecting modern issues, generally because they are

seen on incoming mail and are less expensive than the "classic" (i.e. older) stamps. By "modern", I am referring to the Elizabethanera. The vast majority of these stamps can still be purchased at close to face value.



When Queen Elizabeth took the throne in 1952 approximately 315 stamps had been issued

'til then by Canada. As seen in the accompanying chart, 2,777 stamps (and varieties¹) have been issued since then (to the end of 2008). Even if you ignore the souvenir sheets, back-of-the-book stamps and varieties, you are still looking at over 2,300 stamps to hunt down. Wow!

With this number of modern issues in Canada alone, perhaps you will want to collect by topic such as sports, space, olympics or maybe just those stamps that have some relevance to your home province.

There are many areas within the Elizabethan era where one can concentrate his/her studies: booklets, errors, cancellations, perfins, stationery, joint issues with other countries, collateral material, first day covers, living people on stamps, souvenir articles, coin and stamp combinations ... and the list can go on and on!

By the way, don't forget postal history! History, you say? Yes, history. With postal rates changing almost annually, collectors of rate material have quite a challenge trying to find all of the various usages. Once the postal rates go up, they are history. Anyone putting together an exhibit of modern day material has a tough time finding the necessary covers needed to illustrate all of the different rates and usages.

Despite what one may think, there has been a lot of literature published that is devoted to the Elizabethan era. The *Unitrade Specialized Catalogue of Canadian Stamps* is now the number one source of information on these stamps. Many other "specialized" reference works are available on various aspects of modern day Canadian stamps.

It seems like Yesterday — 50 Years ago

Here is a look back at 50 years ago in Canadian philately...

1959 was another quiet and inexpensive year, compared with the previous year. The six commemoratives that were issued had a total face value of just $30\mathfrak{e}$. 1958 saw eight commemoratives with a face value of $40\mathfrak{e}$. The most 'famous' issue of 1959 had to be the St. Lawrence Seaway with its joint issue with the United States and the infamous "seaway invert" error that caused quite a stir in the press.
