

Royal Wedding Day

A surprise stamp issue commemorating the *day* of the Royal Wedding was announced “at the last minute”.

The design features Their Royal Highnesses The Duke and Duchess of Cambridge travelling in a Landau from Westminster Abbey to Buckingham Palace shortly after they were married.

A single design (Permanent™ value), in a self-adhesive booklet of 10, two different souvenir sheets, and a prepaid postal card were *sheduled* to be released June 22.



However, due to a postal disruption (see page 3), the stamps were not delivered to postal outlets until late June/early July. As such, the “June 22, 2011” first day covers do not truly represent the actual “day of issue”.

2012 Unitrade

The 2012 edition of the *Unitrade Specialized Catalogue of Canadian Stamps* has been completed and sent to the printer. It should be at your local dealer by the end of September or early October. After many years of keeping the price the same (\$42.95), this year’s price rises by a buck to \$43.95. Sixteen more pages have been added to this edition. Nearly 90 pages have been added to the catalogue in the last seven years since the last price increase.



Canada Post News

Here is what Canada Post is up to these days...

► Quarter 3 Stamp Issues

Well, Canada Post is making it even easier to think about giving up collecting modern issues. The unneeded souvenir sheets, postal cards, pane layouts and other collectibles that are arguably targeted strictly at the stamp collector's wallet are becoming quite annoying.

Here is what the July to September 2011 *Details* magazine from Canada Post is showing for new issues this coming quarter:

- June 22 – Royal Wedding Day: booklet of 10, two different souvenir sheets, postal card
- June 30 – Recording Artists: four different booklet panes of 8 stamps each, souvenir sheet of 4, with four different panes of 16 stamps each also released July 30, four different postal cards
- July 7 – Roadside Attractions: booklet pane of 8, souvenir sheet of 4, four different postal cards
- August 8 – Miss Supertest III: booklet of 10, souvenir sheet of 2 with one stamp being at the international rate, two different postal cards, collectible folder (\$19.95)
- August 17 – Canadian Innovations: booklet pane of 8 [the least expensive issue this quarter]
- September 6 – Mental Health semi-postal: booklet pane of 10, souvenir sheet of 2



Total cost for stamps only: \$116.37 + taxes. One might also need to add in various first day covers, the Miss Supertest III collectible folder and quarterly pack due out in a couple of months.

So, six unneeded souvenir sheets, eleven unneeded postal cards, and four unneeded additional panes of 16 for the Recording Artists (see page 14 in this issue).

Postal Disruption

On June 3, after months of negotiations failed to produce a new deal, CUPW members began a series of rolling, 24-hour strikes in cities across the country. The company responded 12 days later by locking out workers, shutting down mail service from coast to coast. Here are notes I took as the “strike” progressed...

June 14
Canada Post suspended operations across the country after 12 days of rotating strikes by its 48,000 unionized urban workers.

A day later, Labour Minister Lisa Raitt signalled that the government would table back-to-work legislation if the two sides couldn’t reach a deal.

June 20
The bill was tabled on June 20 and led the opposition New Democrats to hold a days-long filibuster — a non-stop debate in the House of Commons — to hold up passage of the back-to-work bill for 58 hours.

June 27
Under the terms of federal legislation passed on Parliament Hill over the weekend, Canada Post had to end its lockout and 48,000 urban postal workers had to return to work by 8:45 p.m. ET Monday, June 27.

The Signs of the Zodiac: Cancer issue and souvenir sheet were available at my local post office on the day of issue (June 22). The Royal Wedding Day issue (June 22) was not available until several days after the disruption was over.



Quebec Forgery Cancel

Here is a new cancel applied in Québec to mail that have forgeries.

Memorable Canadian Stamp Numbers

In the September-October 2010 *Corgi Times* (page 24) I included images of our John Deere tractor's "hours of usage" gauge. At the time it was 586 and 593. I commented on how these particular "numbers" had a recognizable significance to me as a stamp collector.

Here is an image of the same gauge, taken in the last week or so ... does Canada Scott number 700 have a philatelic significance to you?



Scott 700 belongs to one of the four 10¢ Inland Vessels stamps released November 19, 1976. These were the second in a four-year series of "Ship" stamps.

I remember that these stamps were quite popular with collectors, especially after the first series (8¢ value) was extremely popular with the public. Many collectors were buying full panes of these on the day of issue in anticipation of an early sell out.

Update to Postage Due Articles

Recently, on eBay there was a correspondence to England in several lots, which had some covers worth noting. All had been prepaid at 4¢ (the domestic local delivery letter rate) and so were short 1¢ of the minimum 5¢ required for a letter to England.

There were two letters mailed in early 1966, and both had a fractional due of 2/5. These are the first examples I have seen using a denominator of 5, for a preferential letter rate.



Another cover was sent January 4, 1963, and was marked T 10 centimes. This becomes the latest known use of the 10 centimes marking.

As noted in the Chung, Machum and Narbonne international rate book on page 182, there was a postal guide supplement dated March 1, 1963 which announced that the new minimum would be lowered from 10 centimes to 5 centimes. At present the earliest known example of this is February 25, 1963 on a letter from Alma Quebec to Belgium, bearing a 5¢ Cameo and marked T 6 centimes (for 2 x the 1 cent deficiency).



There was one other interesting “due” cover on eBay. It was sent from Montreal to the Philippines, and was short 1 cent of postage. The Montreal exchange office used a domestic T 10 cent marking, and in the Philippines postage due of 7 centavos was assessed. The addressee is the same as on the cover shown at the top of page 41 in the Nov-Dec 2009 issue. On that cover it appears that the Philippine Post Office in Manilla dated the cover with a handstamp approximately 6 weeks after the cover was mailed in Canada. The cover recently on eBay had no month of mailing in the machine cancel just a date of 4 _ 1963. Manilla post office markings are from mid-April. If a 6 week transit time is used to estimate the mailing date, this suggests that the cover was sent March 4/63 and assessed 10 centimes due after the rate had been reduced.

Articles Urgently Needed

2011 Quarterly Packs

For the record, here are the packaging and die cut to shape self-adhesive stamps from the first two quarterly packs for 2011. These items are unique and only available in these quarterly packs (some may be available in the annual collection).



The Permanent™ Baby Wildlife coil is from the roll of 5,000. The International Year of the Forests pair has die cutting between the two stamps but it is very shallow. One would likely end up with an attached pair if the backing paper was removed (similar to the two Flower stamp pairs from quarter 1).

The Baby Wildlife singles include the booklet (left column) and coil stamps. The booklet stamps have text on the backing paper. It is not possible to differentiate these particular stamps once they are removed from the backing paper.

Canada Post has introduced a new type of Picture Postage™ ... a Picture *Postcard*. Using your mobile phone or Apple iPod, wherever you are in the world you can take a picture and then have it uploaded to Canada Post and have one or more postcards sent to anyone else in the world, all for \$2.45 per postcard (plus GST/HST).

I first noticed this feature on Canada Post's website while browsing for the various Royal Wedding products (<http://www.canadapost.ca/cpo/mc/personal/campaigns/royal/royal.jsf>).

Using my son's iPod we were able to take a picture of our house, upload the image via the Canada Post app, provide our billing information, select a recipient, enter a message and have the Postcard order generated (order #255). A few days later I received an e-mail (shown at right) indicating that the postcard had been printed and mailed, with details of how the billing would show up on my credit card statement. I was surprised that Lowe-Martin was producing these postcards compared to Canadian Bank Note producing the Picture Postage™ stamps.

A couple of weeks later the postcard arrived!



Picture Postcard produced on Apple iPod (the Harris Homestead, the "capital of Canadian philately")




B A Bank Note Group Presentation Card

Paper Varieties Discovered

Two of our members have recently passed along *just discovered* new paper varieties.

► 1971 Christmas

Mirko Zatka reports the finding of the 10¢ and 15¢ Snowflake Christmas stamps (Scott 556, 557) on *ribbed* paper. This is very distinctive and is like the other ribbed paper varieties of that era (such as the Plains Indians issue).



► 1973 Sir John A Macdonald

Dr. Jim Watt reports finding several panes of the 1¢ Macdonald definitive (Scott 586) on *high fluorescence* paper (nearly high bright).



There is always something to discover on Canadian stamps, even some 40 years later!

Dates of Wilding Plate Proofs and Printings


Exact dates of issue are known for printings from the first plates that were used to produce Wilding post-office panes (see Table). Issue dates of printings from subsequent plates, however, are unknown. Harris [1] provided guesses for the plates that included a printer's control number in the lower-left inscription, based on comparisons with known dates for commemorative issues having similar control numbers. He also took into account the time interval when inscriptions were trimmed off all printings (November 1957 to May 1958) and the introduction of inscriptions on philatelic stock only (May 1958). For some of the later plates, Beaudet [2] found dates on which the Philatelic Service shipped standing orders of inscription blocks, thereby providing a guide to issue dates.

The present study records the date of proof for all of the Wilding plates (see Table). The original, dated plate proofs are preserved in the collection of Library and Archives Canada and can be examined for verification in Ottawa. Descriptions of each proof, including the date, can be accessed online by using "Archives Search" [3]. Because the date of proof preceded the date of issue of printing from a plate, this information can be used to verify or better constrain the issue dates that were previously estimated or unknown (see Table). It seems that the printing from a plate was normally issued within just a few months of the date of proof, further helping to constrain the issue date. The shortest known time difference between proof and issue involved the 6¢ denomination; proofs of plates 1 and 2 were dated May 7, 1954, and the date of issue was June 10, 1954. Possibly the longest delay was for plate 16 of the 2¢ denomination, with the date of proof on January 12, 1960, and the date of shipment of inscription blocks by the Philatelic Service on November 8, 1960. The date of issue of field stock, however, may have preceded the shipment of philatelic material.

In one case, I can provide additional support for the predicted date of issue. Plate 8 of the 2¢ denomination was previously thought to have been issued in summer 1957 (see Table). Based on the date of proof, which was October 5, 1956, an issue date within a

few months seems more likely (i.e., late 1956). This is consistent with an inscription block bearing a cancellation date of December 31, 1956 (see Figure).

Recording Artists 2011




Canada Post's third installment of Recording Artists stamps (the previous sets were issued in 2007 and 2009) were released June 30th. The typical souvenir sheet of four and four different self-adhesive booklets were released, just like the previous issues. However, each of this year's stamps was also released in panes of 16 on July 30. The pane layout is similar to what the United States Postal Service has used on their Legends of Hollywood and other issues – a wide selvedge at right illustrating the honoree in some specific performance.



It turns out that the perforation gauge between the souvenir sheet singles and the panes of 16 stamps are different, thus producing four new varieties. The souvenir sheet is perf 12.5x13.1 while the stamps from the panes of 16 are perf 12.5x12.5.

The souvenir sheet had a printing quantity of 205,000 panes. There were 10,000 panes of each of the panes of 16 stamps produced, resulting in some 160,000 singles, if the panes are torn apart and the stamps actually used. Used specimens of the single stamps from panes of 16 could prove to be quite scarce in the years to come.


Hmm? Another money-grabbing format produced by Canada Post specifically to get more dollars from collectors?



3¢ Beneficial Insect Selvedge Variety

Our post office had the corrected reprint panes for quite some time, but their latest stock is the reprint. Curious?



8¢ Library of Parliament Centennial

While browsing through some Centennial material recently I stumbled across this fascinating plate variety on the 8¢ Library of Parliament stamp. The stamps are general tagged, PVA gum on high fluorescent paper (Unitrade 544pvii).

Notice the vertical flaw passing through the “C” of “CANADA” on the bottom right stamp in this block of four.

I’ve called this the “burning library”.




3¢ Canada Lily Variety


The variety is a green reversed, horizontal checkmark along the left side of the design. The variety is found at position 35 (C5R4).
