# Stamp Recall

In an unwanted first for Canada Post, a newly issued postage stamp has been recalled due to an incorrect image being used.

A set of five different designs featuring UNESCO sites in Canada was issued Friday, July 3. By Tuesday, July 7, just four days after, the \$1.20 value featuring Dinosaur Provincial Park in Alberta, was recalled. Reports suggest that a corrected stamp image will be released [and was, August 21].

Actually, several postal items were recalled, since the design was shared with other stamp and stationery formats:

- booklet of 6 containing three \$1.20 designs
- souvenir sheet of 5 containing three \$1.20 stamps and two \$2.50 stamps
- Official First Day Cover (souvenir sheet)
- postal card (single cards plus the packaged set of five cards)

Post offices received notification on the morning of Tuesday, July 7 to remove all of the above items from sale and return them immediately. Despite that, astute collectors were able to purchase various quantities from post offices who were not aware of the recall. It is unknown how many stamps may have "escaped" into the marketplace.

I first heard of the recall at about 12:50pm CDT via the online Stamp Community Forum newsgroup. A collector posted a message noting the recall based on information he/she heard from their local post office.

I visited about a dozen post offices in Winnipeg and the surrounding area on the day of the recall, with mixed results. My closest corporate outlet (Beausejour) said they could not sell any because the stamps had been recalled. A second corporate outlet (Selkirk) was unaware of the recall; they obviously had not yet read the e-mail nearly three hours after it had been sent out. Three of the post offices I visited had not yet received their UNESCO stamp order. A couple of others had not yet opened their stock and placed it on sale (some four days after the stamps were released!).

I was lucky enough to purchase a full bundle of the recall booklet ... bearing the notation "Package: 1" on the label - the very first bundle produced!

As this is written, about 2½ weeks after the recall, sales of the recall items have been brisk on eBay. The booklets of 6 have 'settled' in around the \$26-32 range. Souvenir sheets are around \$32-52.

Here is what Canada Post is up to these days...


### **▶** 2014/2 Quarter Pack

The second quarterly pack of 2015 showed up in post offices in early July. The package contains the stamps released from April through June. The \$43.95 face value price is reflective of the number of different stamps and formats being issued by Canada Post these days.

Six different issues, comprising 24 different designs, are included:

- Canadian Photography
- Dinos of Canada
- Love Your Pet
- In Flanders Fields
- FIFA Women's World Cup Canada 2015<sup>TM</sup>
- Weather Wonders

There are five souvenir sheets and every issue includes single die cut examples of each stamp. Usually in the past, if a 'half booklet' included all of the designs of that particular stamp issue, the full 'half booklet' was included; not so this time — the single specimens are included. Having the single examples does it make it easier to mount and present the stamps in an album compared to a 'half booklet'.

OFDCs have syrocketed to over \$350. ESG member and FDC expert, Andrew Chung, notes that this is the highest price ever paid for an Canada Post OFDC.

With regards to first day covers; be cautious of *privately* produced UNESCO July 3 so-called "first day covers". It is *very easy* to "back date" a cancel device at nearly any post office. A collector (?) in Kelowna, BC has been selling FDCs of these stamps on eBay and getting very high prices. A close look though, at the cancels, clearly shows that his 'FDCs' were *not* prepared at the same time (there is a date slug alignment problem between his various offerings). I suspct that most, if not all, of his 'FDCs' were cancelled days, or even weeks, *after* the initial stamp's release. You have been warned.

**Stop the press!** An ESG member in the Toronto area has just reported (August 4) that a corporate post office in Toronto is still selling the recalled souvenir sheet and has about a bundle available. This is nearly a month after the recall notice was sent out. It is quite possible that other post offices are unaware of the recall and are still selling UNESCO-related items.

# **Beneficial Insects**

# **New Security Printer**


The Alice Munro stamp, released July 10, 2015, was printed by a new Canadian security printer of postage stamps: Colour Innovations Inc. located in Toronto.

In 2013, incorrectly perforated essays of Scott 2627, the Canadian Photography four-stamp souvenir sheet, appeared on the market. These happened to be printed by Colour Innovations Inc., most likely as a 'sample' of their work requisitioned by Canada Post.



# Canada Post Recalled Items (and Corrected Stamps)

Canada Post has had a few recalls over the years, with the recent UNESCO stamp (July 3, 2015) being the first instance of a postage stamp being recalled.

### Canadian Authors / May 3, 1979


The first recall by Canada Post was the Official First Day Cover issued for the Grove/Nelligan stamp issue of 1979 (Scott 817–818). A replacement OFDC with a corrected image was not made. Canada Post announced the recall for this OFDC, in a Philatelic Bulletin (Vol. 2, No. 3 / Fall 1979).

The mistake was in the cachet. The image identified as "Grove" does not show Mr. Grove. At least one private cachet maker did produce first day covers showing the correct image of Grove.

### **INCORRECT ILLUSTRATION ON OFFICIAL FIRST DAY COVER**


On 3 May 1979 Canada issued two se tenant 17-cent commemorative stamps honouring Canadian authors Frederick Philip Grove and Émile Nelligan.

The Grove stamp featured a wood engraving by Rosemary Kilbourne depicting a scene from the novel Fruits of the Earth, while the Nelligan stamp was a woodcut illustration taken from the poem Le Vaisseau d'or and designed by Monique Charbonneau using the Japanese inking technique called ukiyo-e.

Canada Post's official first day cover featured portraits of both personalities. The portrait illustration of Grove used for the cover cachet design was based on a photograph published ten years ago on the cover of the book Frederick Philip Grove by Ronald Sutherland. Unfortunately, it was not until the covers were prepared and the stamps issued, that Canada Post learned from A. Leonard Grove, son of the famous author, that an incorrect photograph had been printed on the book cover. Upon learning of the error, Canada Post withdrew all remaining stock of the first day covers. However, this action was not taken until one week after the stamps and covers had been issued and it is expected that most collectors had had the opportunity of purchasing their requirements of the official first day covers.

There has been a rumour that the error occurred on the postage stamp itself. However this is incorrect, and the stamps will remain on sale from the Philatelic Service until 3 November 1979, unless supplies are exhausted earlier.

We would like to apologize for any inconvenience this error may have caused, and in order to provide our readers with an insight into the real Frederick Philip Grove, we are reproducing a photograph of the author supplied by his son.

# Great Canadian Comedians / Catherine O'Hara / August 29, 2014

A second OFDC recall was the Catherine O'Hara stamp issue 2014 (Scott 2775). In this instance, the biographical text on the back of the cover gave her credit for an award that she did not actually receive. The incorrect first day covers were removed from sale without any advance notice. A replacement was made, and issued a couple of months later (see *Corgi Times*, September–October 2014).

### Lighthouses / December 27, 2007

A set of five "Flag Over" Lighthouse definitives, issued December 27, 2007, included one illustrating the Pachena Point Lighthouse in British Columbia (Scott 2253). Shortly after the stamps were released, it was announced in the press that the image used on the stamp incorrectly showed a mirror image of the lighthouse.

Canada Post announced that the stamps would remain on sale until stocks were depleted, but that a corrected image would be released ... and was, on May 1, 2008 (Scott 2253B).






Left: incorrect image of Pachena Point Lighthouse, BC. Right: corrected image.

### Winnie The Pooh Brochure / 1996

A brochure made in conjunction with the Winnie The Pooh stamps of 1996 (Scott 1618–1621), inviting 'your family to The Walk Disney World Reseort', had a mistake in the french text.






Above: Original, incorrect translation to french of 'Winnie the Pooh'


Right: Corrected translation.

Winnie the Pooh©!" was shown as "Octobre est le mois des timbres avec en vedette Winnie the Pooh ©". After these brochures were distributed to post offices, but before they were released to the public, Canada Post Retail Business Managers were asked to visit every outlet to remove all error brochures; none were released to the public. A corrected version reading "Octobre est le Mois de la philatelie! En vedette : Winnie l'Ourson.©" was printed and released.

### Wedding Invitations Brochure / 2015

Just recently (Spring 2015), a *Wedding Invitations Made Easy & Elegant* brochure produced by Canada Post was recalled just after it was distributed to post offices. The bilingual, multi-panel pamphlet included a section on how to measure your invitation and what the respective weight limits for 'one domestice stamp' postage rate would be. The original brochure provided incorrect information. A replacement was quickly made and released.

# **Charles de Salaberry Variety?**

ESG member Gary Norris has passed along a possible constant variety on the Charles de Salaberry stamp issue of 2013. The stamp was issued se-tenant with a Laura Secord stamp (Scott 2650–51).

The variety, a pink spot on de Salaberry's right shoulder, is found as position 9 of the stamp pane. Can any other ESG members confirm this variety?





# \$1 Burrowing Owl Coil Wrapper

All Lowe-Martin produced coils have had a 'short' self-adhesive wrapper applied around the start of the roll.

For a brief period of time this early summer, the \$1 Burrowing Owl coil appeared with a new self-adhesive wrapper that was a bit longer but also *extremely sticky* (from coil boxes dated around May 1). Attempting to remove this new wrapper will invariably pull the underlying stamps from the backing paper. Any attempt to get the stamp removed from the wrapper will almost always damage the stamp or leave a bit of adhesive residue on the face of the stamp.


Thankfully (for postal clerks, especially) this new wrapper did not last long.

# 2005 Christmas Snowman

The 50c Snowman Christmas stamp of 2005 (Scott 2124) has turned out to be a very fascinating issue in terms of collectable varieties.

This self-adhesive stamp was released in booklets of 12 stamps.

Since its initial release it has been known that two distinct varieties have been known: those with a 'valley' die cut starting at the upper left and those with a 'peak' die cut starting at the upper left.






'Valley' at upper left

It turns out there are several more die cut varieties. These are apparent at the corners of the stamp. There are stamps with pointed corners and there are stamps with 'blunted' (rounded) corners. A full booklet that shows 'divots' at the intersection of the stamps produces single stamps with the blunted corners.


For specialist collectors, these blunted corners produce six new single-stamp die cut varieties.







Actual size images of die cutting varieties

Corners with arrows are "blunted" ('half' rounded); other corners are longer and 'pointed'


# **Cameo Image used on Product Advertising**

The brochure's form date was "10-6-66". All of the stamps reproduced were printed by lithography to intaglio.
