BNAPEX '98, at Orlando, FL, was another successful meeting. Perhaps the prime measurement is the number of members in attendance. Orlando came in ahead of Ft. Worth and well behind St. John's, Newfoundland. I will predict now that BNAPEX '99 in Vernon, B.C. will match or surpass St. John's. Why? The crew in charge already have much of the event already planned. I have been in Vernon several times for various events (most BNAPS related) and they are coming up with some super events that have never surfaced in the past. This is a location that almost demands you schedule additional time for a fall vacation - travel, sight seeing, fishing, hunting, whatever - just a great area. Block off the dates now - see the Planning Calendar on page 26.

Back to Orlando, TOPICS and BNAPortraitS will each provide coverage of the meeting but one area deserves special mention. Those of us isolated from the Canadian market look to the annual convention as an opportunity to add items to our collection. When held in the U. S. we worry as the bourse is apt to be limited. Yes, to some extent it was but a number of super loyal dealers made sure there was an ample amount of material available. BNAPS owes a tremendous thank you to Chuck Firby, John Jamieson, Bob Lee, Bill Longley, Bill McCann and Hank Narbonne. Because of their dedication, hard work and willingness to take an unnecessary amount of harassment from U. S. Customs it appeared everyone was able to find some nice items. As usual, some of my finds will most likely show up in this issue.

One of the most interesting meetings at the convention was put on by Cimon

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Morin from the Canadian National Archives. This was an electronic demonstration of the overall plan of the Archives for making available on line access to their stamp holdings as well as associated material and postal history data under any number of alternative search keys. This is a very long range project but with the plan in place various pieces will gradually be put in place and available.

Back in April 1997 (page 86 of Vol. V, No. 5) I reported that Cimon Morin was working on an update of his earlier compilation and supplement - Canadian Philately: Bibliography and Index. I am pleased to report this undertaking is now finished and has just been released as Vol. III containing 360 pages with 4,564 new references covering publications up to December 1993. It provides references for English and French language publications dating from the earlier volumes, 1981 to 1993 inclusive, including listing pre-1981 documents not appearing in the previous works. This series is indispensible for anyone engaged in research of Canadian material whether stamps or postal stationery. The volume or all three volumes are available from Saskatoon Stamp Centre - all contact options appear on Page 40.

Dated October 1998, Saskatoon Stamp Centre released catalogue #205: Canadian & BNA Philatelic Literature. It is extremely well done with an excellent description of each listing. Offerings run the gauntlet from scarce volumes, seldom seen, to the new 1999 Unitrade Specialized Catalogue. I recommend a copy for study and for retention in your files.

On page 28 (con't on page 30) is a report of the results of the 1998 joint Centennial/Elizabethan Study Group mail auction and a detailed announcement of the 1999 auction. With full insurance coverage now in place we hope everyone will participate and make this auction the best ever. A long range goal has been auction revenues of \$5,000. This could be the year.

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SECTION I - CANADA'S EMBOSSED ISSUES

In order to develop the same degree of security as intaglio printing at less cost, CANADA POST CORPORATION experimented with multiple color lithography combined with precision embossing. Ten designs were produced over a six year period. An eleventh design was produced in 1986. All eleven were printed by Ashton-Potter in Toronto.

(Editors Note: This listing was provided by Mr. Stillions a long time ago and lost. At Orlando this year he agreed to provide a replacement. My finger tip sensing tells me there is an untold story here and I hope one of our readers has the answer or is able to point the way).

SECTION I - A REPORT ON TAGGING ON ATM STAMP - by: Harry Voss

Canada's Stamp Details booklet for March/April 1998 (also most recent Sept./Oct.) states the ATM stamp is general tagged, four sides. Actually they are with short wave tagging the same as on U. S. stamps. Using a Raytech LS 7 ultraviolet lamp, with the long wave light the stamp is dull but with the short wave the stamp glows the characteristic greenish color. Evidently this taggant will also activate the Canadian C. T. F.'s.

Shown on the next page are three covers which I mailed from the U.S. At the top is an ATM mailed from Denver, CO and the bottom two were mailed from Anaheim, CA. All came through without any additional markings. (I was hoping for a postage due or some marking e.g. Foreign Stamp Used.

R. Maresch & Son's June 23-24 sale contained a good deal of desirable material for Group members. Lot 1903 contained two complete mint sheets of fifty (Plate No.1) of the 1953 \$1 Totem Pole. Although two stamps had a light gum bend, the lot sold for \$178.25 against a 1998 Unitrade Catalogue value of \$1530 (prices include the 15% buyer's fee).

Unusual die proofs were at centre stage in this sale. Lot 1917 included an engraved progressive die proof in black of the head and background of the 1969 6¢ Stephen Leacock issue. Marked "proof" in pencil and "P-29", it had an estimate of \$500+. It realized \$402.50. A similar die proof of the 1971 7¢ Pierre Laporte issue in black (lot 1924) with a similar estimate sold for \$517.50. Perhaps the most spectacular however was lot 1925, the 1973 \$1 Vancouver die proof of the view section marked "No. 2" in pencil and in full colour. With an estimated value of \$750+, the proof reached \$1495!

Mint centre blocks of four of the 1970 5¢ and 6¢ Christmas issues were sold in lots 1918-1921. Prices ranged from \$161 (lot 1918, LH) to \$109.25 (lot 1921, NH), with a <u>Unitrade</u> value quoted at \$350 for each lot. Complete mint NH sheets of the issues sold for \$149.50 (lot 1922) and \$155.25 (lot 1923). The sheets had a quoted <u>Unitrade</u> value of \$350+.

An appropriate acquisition for this year was the 1973 RCMP 15¢ Musical Ride mint NH imperf pair (without the usual gum wrinkles) in lot 1926. It sold for \$264.50 against a <u>Unitrade</u> value of \$750. Lot 1927 followed with a NH imperf pair but with one of the stamps severely wrinkled. It sold for \$230. An imperf NH strip of three of the error in lot 1928, with usual gum wrinkles and a <u>Unitrade</u> value of \$750+, sold for \$253.

A NH 1976 8¢ Royal Military College horizontal imperf pair, with a tiny spot of adherence, was offered in lot 1929. Estimated at \$2000+ and with a <u>Unitrade</u> value of \$2500, it reached \$2070. Other rarities included lot 1930, a mint NH 1979 \$2 Kluane with missing silver inscriptions which sold for \$253 (<u>Unitrade</u> \$750); lot 1933, a mint NH 1986 \$5 La Mauricie with "Canada", "Postes/Postage", and "\$5" inscriptions missing, which went to a new home for \$1063.75 (<u>Unitrade</u> \$2500); and lot 1934, a mint NH 1983 32¢ Discovery of Nickel single with missing silver which realized \$603.75 (<u>Unitrade</u> \$1000).

The 1989 38¢ Regiments inscription blocks are steadily coming onto the market now but prices seem to be relatively constant from a few years ago. Lots1935-1938 all contained single mint NH plate blocks from the various corners. Each had a <u>Unitrade</u> value of \$300, Prices ranged from \$115 (lots 1935 and 1938) to \$109.25 (lots 1936 and 1937). An unaddressed F.D.C. with an inscription block (lot 1939) sold for \$40.25. These were approximately the same prices as last year (June 1997).

The firm's October 27-28 sale looks good too with a few lots including a part-imperforate block of the 1976 8¢ Royal Military College and an imperf strip of the 1995 45¢ Flag coil. Contact R. 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SECTION IV - ENVIRONMENTS - 32¢ QUEEN ELIZABETH MISSING NUMBERS By: John Arn

Shown below are two Scott #792 - the 32¢ dull blue and grey Queen Elizabeth with missing numerals. One is missing the "2" of 32 and the second "A" of Canada is partially missing. It also is a beautiful double Cameo (while showing it is not as crystal clear in the photocopy). The other stamp is missing the "3" of 32. "CANADA" is fine and there is no trace of a double Cameo although the photocopy implies doubling.



Normal Missing "3" Missing "2"


All of the double cameo material that I have examined shows the doubling on all copies of the piece. Assuming my sample was adequate then it would indicate these two stamps came from two different sheets. Two different panes? Maybe, I am not sure whether or not it would be possible for a double Cameo pane and one without a trace of doubling to both come from the same sheet. Perhaps one of our readers will clarify this possibility.

Several years ago Canadian Stamp News had a short article to the effect that a similar stamp had been found in the Ste. Marie, Ontario area with the "2" missing. I have been able to verify that this find is still being held. As far as can be determined the CSN article did not surface any additional information.

The most likely explanation for the missing numbers seems to be foreign material on the printing surface which prevented part of the design to register. If anyone has further information on these varieties please pass the information on to the Editor.

Taking the **tiger** by the tail

or many Chinese, the Year of the Tiger symbolizes a time for change, heralding bold and challenging ideas.

So it's appropriate that Canada Post adopt a bold idea to promote its Year of the Tiger commemorative stamp by partnering with one of its major customers, AGF Group of Funds, to pre-print an image of the stamp on AGF's stationery.

AGF is one of Canada's most broadly diversified wealth management organizations, managing more than \$13 billion in assets. It does about \$2 million in business with CPC every year, primarily in Lettermail and Addressed Admail.

"AGF's internationally-recognized tiger logo has long symbolized the company's desire to aggressively meet new challenges, adjust to change and remain alert," says Kent Milburn, account executive, York Central, "The Year of the Tiger stamp was a natural fit and AGF agreed."

After a meeting between Canada Post and AGE senior management, Milburn quickly moved in to work out the details. Working closely with Micheline Montreuil, director, and Danielle Trottier, production co-ordinator of Stamp Products, Milburn arranged to pre-print an image of the stamp on more than one million envelopes, the key means used to communicate with its 600,000 Carradiam inavestors, and on postcards to its 20,000 diistriibautoors wiishiing them a proffitable and excitting wear. Canada Post agreed to have the envelopes aimid posticands nearly fiollowing the official stramp achease im Bonomto and Vancouver on January 8.

"It was a very tight turnaround," Milburn says, "Fortunately there was excellent communication between us and I was able to rely on the excellent cooperation and expertise of the Stamp Marketing group, which arranged for the design, printing and production."

"All of the administrative elements were flawless, and we were very impressed with the result. The cost was also very competitive," says Barry Stephens, manager, Client Communications for AGE.

What the company didn't expect was the overwhelming response.

"We felt the artwork was so visually compelling that we bought first day covers and had them framed for some of our preferred distributors and are using the artwork on other promotional activities," says Eric Grove, AGF's vice-president of Marketing. "But we didn't anticipate being inundated with calls from our customers and distributors asking for extra copies, We've even had calls from collectors offering to buy the stationery from us."

This success has prompted AGF to consider a second printing once their current inventory has been exhausted.

·A Prized Catch!

When the Year of the Tiger stamp was released in January an uncut press sheet sold for about \$25. A month later two were auctioned off for \$2,000 a piece.

Bill Yuen, manager, Major Accounts, Vancouver, auctioned two uncut press sheets of the popular stamps on a Chinese radio talk show in Vancouver.

"I couldn't believe it. The bidding started at \$50 and then went to \$100 and before long it went to over \$1,000," he says.

The money raised for the sheets, just less than \$4,000, went to charity. Rick McCorkell, manager, Philatelic Programs, says the response to the stamps is unprecedented.

Today, if you want to hunt a Year of the Tiger press sheet down, luckily \$2,000 is not the going rate. McCorkell says if you can find one, the sheet sells for about \$80. CC

Year of Tiger Stamp Sales Roar A tiger is on the loose in

A tiger is on the loose in Vancouver. Its name is Retail Sales.

Following the launch of the Year of the Tiger stamp at the Chinese Cultural Centre in Vancouver on Jan. 8, where sales topped \$7,000 in the first two-and-a-half hours, CPC sponsored the annual Sunbrite Chinese New Year Fair, the largest of its kind outside China.

"During the fair's four-day run (Jan. 24 to 27), total net sales of Year of the Tiger stamps and related philatelic products were a whopping \$50,410," says Pat Hue, officer, Retail Sales and Merchandising, Pacific region. "Customers love them."

"Interest in the Chinese New Year products has been incredible," says Randy Carter, manager, Retail, Inventory Logistics.

"We increased distribution of uncut press sheets of the Tiger stamp by 100 per cent over last year's offering, the Year of the Ox," he says.

"By the end of the Sunbrite fair, three weeks after the Tiger's launch, all 30,000 uncut press sheets were gone." *DC*

Making Inroads in the Orient: New Stamp Distribution Deal

This has been the year of Asía-Pacífic in more ways than one. Since taking on the role of manager, Major Accounts, for Vancouver and outlying areas earlier this year, Bill Yuen has received many leads and signed some significant contracts with Asian businesses.

His most recent contract of note is a fiveyear, multi-million dollar distribution agreement with a private Chinese-Canadian entrepreneur.

Handley Enterprises will sell Canadian stamps and Canada Post retail products to philatelists and retail stores in China and Hong Kong, where stamp collecting is a very popular hobby.

The contract translates into revenues of millions of dollars, with a promise to sell millions of Canadian stamps. But Yuen says

this contract means a lot more than dollar signs.

"Through Canada Post's stamps and products, Canadian culture and values are being promoted to the Asian world."



SEC. V & SEC. VIII - TWO NEW IMPERFORATE ERRORS - The 12-Cents Peregrine Falcon and the 48-Cents McIntosh Apple

Two new imperforate errors were for the same time offered for sale by Eastern Auctions Ltd. The first was the 12-cents Peregrine Falcon and the second was the 48-cents McIntosh Apple.

Peregrine Falcon - 12-cents (Scott No. 752/Darnell No. 810) January 18, 1978 and the McIntosh Apple 48-cents (Scott No. 1361/Darnell No. 1412) December 27, 1991.

a) A description of the stamps

The 12-cents Peregrine Falcon is part of the endangered wildlife series that we issued in the late 1970's and early 1980's. This stamp was issued on January 18, 1978 and was designed by Robert Bateman. It was printed in shades of grey, yellow and black. The stamp was printed by Ashton-Potter Limited, Toronto. 31.8 million stamps were printed. Lithography was used in the printing process. Its size is approximately 40mm x 24mm (horizontal) and its perforations are 12.5 x 12.5. PVA gum was used as the adhesive and the stamps are Ottawa tagged vertically on both sides. The stamps were printed in sheets with 50 to a pane.

The stamp depicts the falcon also known as the "duck hawk'. By nature and instinct it is a bird of prey and lives in remote area of Canada. It is considered one of the fastest birds with diving speeds of approximately 200 miles per hour. The stamp depicts the bird on the left perched at the edge of a cliff. At the bottom left is the name of country 'Canada'. In the top left is the value "12', at its side is the bilingual inscription 'postage postes' followed by its name 'Falco pereginus'.

The 48-cents McIntosh Apple was designed by Clermont Malenfant and issued on December 27, 1991. It is part of the current definitive series. It was printed using the lithographic process by Ashton-Potter Limited with a perforation of 13.1 on coated paper in sheets of 50 stamps per pane. The adhesive used was PVA and the stamps are tagged on four sides. This stamp also appeared in a booklet format of 5 stamps with a perforation of 14.6 x 13.8. The stamp is printed in colours of green, orange-red, white, brown and black.

The 48-cents stamp depicts the McIntosh Apple. This variety of apple was discovered in 1811 by accident on John McIntosh's homestead in Dundela, Ontario. It has been described as the "apple of apples". It is known for its beautiful red colour, uniformity in size and shape. The design depicts the apple tree in bloom showing a large white flower against the background of the apple. On the right, at the top, is the name of the country 'Canada'. On the top left is the value of the stamp '48'. Inscribed vertically on the left, from bottom to top, is the bilingual message 'McIntosh Apple' Pommier McIntosh' the french below the english inscription.

b) A description of the errors

The Falcon and McINtosh Apple are fully imperforate errors. In other words,



the stamps have no perforation on all four sides. An illustration of the errors

c) The story about the errors



Canada

It is not known where these errors were found. Knowledge of their existence was made known through a mail auction newspaper.

In June 1998, Eastern Auctions Ltd., offered these fully imperforate errors for sale. This catalogue described the falcon error as follows:

"1236 * 752 var, 12¢ unlisted imperf single showing part of the next stamp on top, VF NH(P).....E400.00+" (p.9).

The McIntosh apple error was described as:

"1244 * 1361 var, 48¢ unlisted imperf single showing a large part of the next stamp in the top margin, VF NH(P).... E400.00+" (p.9).

In the description of both stamps, the auctioneer notes that these were the only imperforates of these stamps that he had seen.

Not much is known about the format in which these errors were found. Generally, fully imperforates come in a sheet (or sheets) with two or more panes or are found in sheets due to a result of multiple skips or jumps of the perforator, resulting in rows or columns of stamps that are fully and partially imperforate. The former format is more common. It is generally a result of certain sheets or panes being taken for examination and later accidentally being placed with perforated sheets. The sheets are then cut up for distribution and end up in different packages ready for sale. If this explanation is the true cause of the error, several other fully imperforate errors should exist from the same sheets, i.e., fifty per pane. Consequently, if more than one pane exists multiples of fifty should exist.

In due course of time, more information on this mysterious citing will likely When this does occur, additional information on these newly discovered imperforates will be provided.





Page 17 - top - (Background - The hold mail fee was introduced Sept. 1, 1976 at \$1.00 per 3 months held. By Jan. 1959 the rate was \$1.59 per month and from June 1985 it was \$2.00 per week.

The holding period for the piece shown was two weeks reflecting

a rate of \$2.05 per week for a total payment of \$4.10.

Further note - By Jan. 1990 the rate was \$2.25 per week and the hold mail rate was one of the few remaining which was regulated. Registration and Certified Mail were de-regulated meaning Canada Post no longer required an act of Parliament to change the rates.

<u>Page 17 - bottom</u> - Total Postage Paid was \$2.78. First class mail first step was 45¢ leaving \$2.33 for the Special Delivery Fee. <u>Note:</u> Our consulting source does not currently have the tables for this time period which would explain the calculation of the Special Delivery Fee. The problem is being worked and we hope to supply this information in a future issue.

Further note - Obviously no special delivery service was received at the Toronto end because the mail went into a box. There may not have been any special handling (being merely direct mail from Montreal or wherever). XPRESSPOST advertises faster delivery between major population centers.


Page 28 - top - This is a basic letter rate of 34¢ plus \$2.46 registration. W. E. M. P. S. =s "West Edmonton Mall Postal Submarine." The mall is noted for submarines and you would think they might be more original and use a periscope design or something for their postmark.

<u>Page 28 - bottom</u> - Total postage paid was \$3.13. Registration (green label) was \$2.70 plus first step first class letter rate of 43¢. bb-255 is the page and line number in the book that the recipient signed to receipt f or the registered item.


HOLDING MAIL - AN ERROR (FOUND AT ORLANDO)

Holding mail can be expensive. It can also be a bargain. Shown is a request to hold mail for the period 5 Nov. 85 to 15 Apr. 86. The card reads "A fee of \$1.00 must be prepaid for each 3 month period or portion thereof that you request mail held from delivery." The card carries a form no. 33-086-028 (11-76) - clearly from the original printing as explained above. In the interim the fee had moved to \$2.00 per week. The Post Office Clerk handling this request collected, in error, only \$25.00 (five Scott # 937 Point Pelee stamps) whereas the correct fee should have been \$50.00 for the 25 week holding period.





Cover E - 14 VIII 89 - Special Lettermail - Apparently started in Kitchener, Ont. on II VIII 89 (see reverse side) - a warranty registration card for a Vacuum addressed to B&D. Brockville, Ontario & sent SPECIAL LETTERMAIL for \$3.01. Front of card hard to read but two time clock cancels seem to read "OTTAWA FORWARD MAIL / AUG 2 1989" and the two circular date stamp cancels were on 14 Aug. 1989 in Brockville - seems like a pretty slow boat for high cost special service? All front cancels in red. How was the rate calculated? Why not sent as regular first step first class mail?



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Cover F - 21 III 1988 from Smith Falls, Ont. to Brockville, Ont. registered with total postage of \$3.09. Back stamped "Registration Section, Smith Falls, 22 III 1988. How was rate determined?

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
