Certainly a good case can be made that this leads to a vibrant program and keeps those following new issues very much on the alert.

Unannounced: Each Greeting Stamp pack (booklet) contains 3 horizontal and 2 vertical frames plus stickers on a removable sheet. The frames form the perimeter of the stamp for use with five special stickers: Sleigh, Santa Claus, Holly, Christmas Tree and Angel. Editors comment: A great item!! Also a procedure is in place to obtain 25 personalized 22 mm X 15 mm self-adhesive stickers plus 25 frames utilizing the picture of your choice.

SNAKES, SKATES, SUMMITS AND MORE: 2001 STAMP PROGRAM HAS SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE

Ottawa - September 1, 2000 - The Honourable André Ouellet, President and Chief Executive Officer of Canada Post, is pleased to announce details of the 2001 stamp program. Next year's program continues to offer favourite subjects like the Lunar New Year, Birds and Masterpieces of Canadian art. Customers and philatelists alike are sure to enjoy the beauty of new and exciting subjects as well, including the World Figure Skating Championships, Canadian roses, and the anniversaries of organizations such as the YMCA and the Royal Military College.

Among the subjects in the 2001 stamp program:

Happy New Year - Canada Post celebrates the Year of the Snake with a domestic-rate stamp and international rate souvenir sheet to honour the Chinese Lunar New Year. The stamps will be available on January 5, in anticipation of the beginning of the Year of the Snake on January 24.

Hockey heroes - Canada Post celebrates Canada's national winter sport by continuing the NHL All-Star series in 2001.

Birds of a feather - In February, a new set of Bird stamps will catch your eye featuring the Lapland longspur, the Arctic tern, the Golden eagle and the Rock Ptarmigan. Envelopes featuring the Lapland longspur and the golden eagle will also be available.

Canadian art - As part of its Masterpieces of Canadian art series, Canada Post will issue an international rate stamp featuring a painting by Jack Shadbolt, renowned British Columbia artist.

Show on ice - Canada Post hits the ice in March with four stamps to mark the World Figure Skating Championships being held in Vancouver.

Postal history - In April, Canada Post will mark the 150th anniversary of the transfer of postal authority from Great Britain to Canada by making the Three Pence Beaver, the first Canadian postage stamp issued on April 23, 1851, available once again at the domestic rate.

International gathering- A single domestic-rate stamp will honour the Summit of Americas, being held in Quebec City from April 20-22.

Play ball - Canada Post will hit a home run by commemorating the 25th anniversary of the Blue Jays with a single domestic-rate stamp.

Are we there yet? - Canada Post is on the road in May with Tourist Attractions stamps featuring ten of Canada's most attractive sites. Five of the stamps will be available at the international rate while the other five will be available at the U.S. rate.

Medical pioneers - Also in May, a special envelope will mark the 100th anniversary of the Canadian Medical Protective Association (1901-2001).

Military precision - The 125th anniversary of the Royal Military College is honoured in June with a single domestic-rate stamp

Historic peace - Canada Post will commemorate the signature, 300 years ago, of the treaty of La Grande Paix de Montréal with a stamp.

World athletics - During the summer, a two-stamp issue will coincide with the Francophone Games being held in the National Capital Region from July 14-24.

Red, red roses - In July, flowers will be in full bloom in Morden, Manitoba, with a set of four stamps depicting various Canadian roses. These stamps will also be launched in Japan during the 2001 Stamp Show.

Medal pursuit - On August 3rd, Canada Post marks the International Amateur Athletic Federation World Championships being held in Edmonton from August 3-12 with a domestic rate stamp.

Curtains rise - In the fall, the curtain will rise on stamps marking the 50th anniversary of

Montreal's Théatre du Nouveau Monde and the 100th anniversary of London's Grand Theatre.

Up, up and away - Spectacular and colourful hot air balloons will float on four domestic- rate stamps to celebrate this year's "October is Stamp Month."

Religious beginnings - A stamp will be issued to commemorate the 1,700th anniversary of the Armenian Apostolic Church.

Festive lights - Christmas will be bright at Canada Post with a set of stamps featuring Christmas Lights issued in November.

Wellness and sports-The YMCA will be recognized with a stamp honouring its $150^{\mbox{th}}$ anniversary in Canada.

Honouring Veterans - The 75th anniversary of the Royal Canadian Legion will be commemorated with a single domestic-rate stamp, issued on November 11 to coincide with Remembrance Day.

Orapex 2000 & The Fifth Canadian National Philatelic Literature Exhibition by Joseph Monteiro

Orapex 2000 and the fifth Canadian National Philatelic Exhibition were held on May 6 and 7, 2000. This exhibition was a much better show than the one held the previous year largely due to its better performance on the literature side. As usual, there were dealers, Canada Post Office, stamp exhibits and literature exhibits.

Two special 46-cents bird envelopes were overprinted, commemorating Henry Heckler (1853-1928). Henry Heckler was a well known collector, dealer and philatelic organizer. In addition, two special cachets were available on the envelopes showing the 'One Penny Black'. The two are very similar, the only difference between them is that one also contains the inscription 'PHILATELY - PHILATELIE'. These two envelopes are shown hereafter for the benefit of those philatelists who did not get a chance to visit Ottawa.



The most important aspect of these shows is the exhibition of stamps and the business it generates for the dealers. It also serves as a meeting place for various collectors, authors and editors and a place to view the various types of literature from various countries that are available. Since the literature is usually kept in a cupboard and available on request, it cannot be viewed by passerby's and therefore does not have the greatest impact. We shall now turn to examine some of the results of the literature exhibition.

LITERATURE AWARDS

There were 147 awards given for literature. These are shown in Table 1 below (the statistics below exclude the non-competitive class). More than fifty percent of these entries were in Class A - Handbooks, Monograms, Pamphlets and Special Studies

Countries that were the Best Performers: The Countries that were the best performers were U.S.A. (4); Canada (4); Switzerland (2); Belgium (1); and Czechoslovakia (1). All of the above twelve awards were gold and the gold with felicitations was won by Galen D. Harrison from the US for his book "prisoners' Mall From the Civil War". The next category of achievers who won Vermeils were from: USA (8); Canada (6); UK (5); Italy (5); France (3); Australia (1); Dominican Republic (1); Czechoslovakia (1). Three of these were Vermeils with felicitations. Of these, two were from UK and one was from France. In the other categories, fifty-six awards were silver, forty-two were silver-bronze and seven were bronze. If tliese results were plotted on a graph it would appear in the shape of a bell, peaking at the silver award.

Distribution of Awards between Classes: An examination of these awards by the three major classes Class A (Books, etc.); Class B (Catalogues, etc.); and Class C (Newsletters or Periodicals, etc.) does not indicate any unusual distribution of the awards. For example, slightly more than ten percent won gold in Class A and Class B. However in Class C, the performance of entrants appear comparatively worse, since no entry won a gold and an even smaller percent won a vermeil in comparison to categories A or B. Finally, in Class G (Electronic publication) one entry won a gold. This was the publication by "Scott-U.S. Stamp Collector's Database 2000 [CD -ROM]"

Concluding Remarks on Literature Awards: In conclusion, the distribution of awards appear to be well balanced between each class and between various classes for literature. It should be remembered however that the overall distribution of awards is traditionally quite similar to the distribution of awards for philatelic literature entries.

A BRIEF COMPARISON OF THE LITERATURE AWARDS AT ORAPEX AND STAMP SHOW 2000 - LONDON

The literature awards at the World Exhibition - Stamp Show 2000 - in London will be compared with the awards at Orapex 2000 to see if there are any noticeable differences. At Stamp Show 2000, 183 awards were given in Classes 1-3 which correspond to the Classes A to G at Orapex (Class 1=Class A; Class 2=Class B; and Class 3=Classes C to G). The awards as a percent of the total awards are shown in Table 2.

The statistics reveal that only 3 percent won a gold in London compared to 8 percent in Ottawa, suggesting it was a bit more difficult to win a gold at the World Exhibition. A larger percentage won a vermeil at London than in Ottawa. About the same percent won a silver and bronze at both shows. Finally, a much larger percent won a silver-bronze at Orapex than at Stamp Show 2000.

A brief review of the awards by Class suggest that Class 1 fared comparatively better than Classes 2 or 3 in London. Slightly more than half the entries in London either won a gold or vermeil in Class 1. This compares roughly with a quarter of the entries that won a vermeil in Classes 2 and 3. Further, there was no gold awards in Class 2 or Class 3 in London unlike the Orapex show. The conclusion one may draw from this may be slightly misleading if one concludes that it is easier to get to the top in Class 1, as only .55 percent and 2.73 percent won a gold or large vermeil of all entries, respectively. In terms of percent, within Class 1 it was 6.45 and 22.5, respectively.

THE AWARDS CEREMONY

The awards ceremony is always the most enjoyable part of the show. The teremony is attended by the some of the big winners, patrons of the RA Stamp Club, Judges, dealers and the key organizers. The awards are presented with the customary glamour and speeches. Thereafter is the buffet dinner. It is done with the usual grandeur and style. The ticket for the awards is extremelly reasonable priced and if any of the philatelists have not attended this ceremony they should ticket for the awards is extremely reasonable priced and if any of the philatelists have not attended this ceremony they should try to attend it in the future. Wine, cheese and many snacks to satisfy the most demanding palate.

Most of the philatelists and guests who attend this ceremony are very friendly. Perhaps, the only factor that was noticeable and pointed out to me was that most of the Judges stuck to themselves. They perhaps have their reasons for sticking together as is often characteristics of most people who are acquainted with each other. However, it should be noted that they are quite friendly as I know some of them personally.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

Orapex 2000 is an annual philatelic event in Ottawa and was organized quite well. The literature part of the event was far superior than the previous literature show. The certificate now presented is also far superior than the older ones, creating a better impression of an award. If it also provided some sort of a medal, rather than a sticker it would rank on a par with some of the national shows in the United States of America.

Notwithstanding some of the minor deficiencies, it was an excellent show for a population the size of Ottawa. Most philatelists in Ottawa would not be disappointed if they attended this annual philatelic event.

CANADA POST GENERAL PURPOSE CACHETS - BACKGROUND -

Starting in 1949, Canada Post produced a general purpose cacheted envelope which was used to replace covers which were received in damaged condition. The same basic design was printed several times and was in use until the end of 1965. This design is generally referred to as Type I.

A Type 2 was used only for the 1966 stamp issues.

A special cachet (Type 3) incorporated the Centennial logo as part of the design and was used for stamps issued in 1967.

A new design (Type 4) was introduced in 1968 and was used until the early part of 1971.


A Type 5 was brought out in 1971 and was used until 1974. Since that time Canada Post has replaced damaged covers with the Official Canada Post cachets for the specific stamp issue.

Since these General Purpose Cachets were not issued on a regular basis they are much rarer than regular private or Official cachets used for each stamp issue.




Now, from an entirely different source, the Editor is pleased to share the most recent addition to his Red Dues exhibit.


