Edmonton Meeting - April 27th

March 1, 1974

Dear Friends:-

I received a letter the other day from the Edmonton Club inviting me to be the after dinner speaker at their annual stamp convention and show on April 27th. I was glad to accept and will be there with bells on. I understand there will be a strong exhibition and bourse, but they are placing particular emphasis on activities, such as seminars, films and the like. Mr. Keith Spencer writes: "We hope to, in this way, exercise our mandate to promote stamp collecting and intend to cater to a wide cross-section of the stamp interested public. There will be an auction of estate materials - mainly foreign. Sure hope you can come - I'll be glad to meet you there.

Lorne Kirkwood, a well known North Toronto stamp collector died recently. I had known him for over 35 years and during that time he was a most enthusiastic and ardent collector. His greatest interests were the local stamp clubs, particularly the West Toronto Club and looking after sales books. Lorne loved mounting the books and taking them to the club. Selling, trading and buying stamps was his forte. Like a lot of us he was a hoarder of all stamps, any country, and quantity, mint, used, blocks, covers, revenues, perfins, precancels, catalogues, stamp literature and magazines. Over the years he built up quite an amazing stock, particularly of used Canada. Just to give you an idea there were over 800 fine copies of the 10c. Loyalist.

Lorne was very particular about the condition of his stamps and spent a big part of his hobby time going over hundreds of thousands, soaking, sorting, counting, and of course all poor and damaged stamps were thrown out. He put them into stock books or envelopes, properly catalogued and in order. His inventory records would make General Motors envious, and the stamp club transactions were neatly recorded back to 1928 right down to the last cent with the date, collectors name and address and comments.

He had two stamp rooms in the house. A den on the second floor where he kept his albums, stock books and an excellent library - Boggs, Jarrett, all the Holmes and dozens of other catalogues and reference books, plus hundreds of stamp magazines. The second room was in the basement and this is where he squirreled away all his surplus stamps in filing cabinets, drawers, cigar boxes, etc. a veritable dealers' paradise.

Our bid to the Executives of his Estate was the highest and was accepted. It was quite some job getting everything packed and moved to the Empire. I brought several carloads and eventually had to get a trucker for the balance.

Remember last month I told you about my father's 80th birthday, January 8th. We had a cocktail party that night to celebrate the event and it should have been a complete failure as father doesn't drink that is. However, it turned out to be a grand affair with old friends he had not seen in years. Stamp dealers and their wives from as far away as New York, our advertising agents from Chicago, Mr. W.A. Bishop, age 94, dad's first Bank Manager and the current one Mr. W. McCrae, brokers, relatives and so on, everyone we could think of except his creditors. The party was all a surprise to him, but he went through the evening with colours flying high. The next morning he was at his desk working - a few days later golfing in the snow, and is now saying, "let's have another party like that next year."

Incidentally he has given me the O.K. to buy all the stamps I want - Have you anything to sell?

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THOUGHTS & THINGS FROM THE EDITOR

TIME FOR A CHANGE

Compromise makes a good umbrella but a poor roof.

The editorial in the past issue of the CANADIAN PHILATELIST in favour of the stamp issuing policy of the Canada Post Office for 1974 evoked more interest and reply than any other previously published. As of this time (February 3) eighteen letters have been received condemning the postage stamp programme for the coming year. Almost all state that 45 stamps are too much for one year and prophesy dire consequences. Ten writers specifically mention that they feel that Canada's entry into the realm of the semi-postals (olympic stamps) would prove to be a philatelic disaster. A few hinted that the cost of maintaining a Canada collection would be too high and a few objected not so much from the standpoint of the actual number of stamps themselves, but rather because the quality of each stamp would suffer, or the purpose for which the stamp was being issued would be diluted.

On the other hand more than half again as many people (twenty-nine) supported the editorial. It is significant that most of these people stated that they would have spoken up sooner if they had not been intimidated by the initial widespread publicity opposing their views.

Although these statistics may come as a surprise to many, they were more or less what was expected in light of the research upon which the original editorial was based. Dealers, stamp club members, individual collectors were approached and it was established that over 90 per cent of the people purchasing stamps from established full time dealers, from approval dealers and possibly from the Canada Post Office have no affiliation with any philate-

lic organization; that the vast majority of collectors purchase or collect single stamps or sets of stamps with more concern for quantity than quality and have only minor concern for cost provided they are able to get enough materials to support their interest. Most of the dealers questioned who depend on stamps as their sole source of livelihood agreed that they could not stay in business if they had to depend upon members of stamp clubs - especially those who specialize.

There is little doubt that the Canada Post Office also could not stay in business if it had to depend upon collectors as its source of revenue. Thus there is a distinct possibility that the revision of the stamp issuing programme for this year (see page 77) was a result of a reassessment of the economic and administrative problems involved in producing and handling so many stamps. If this is the case, then the only fault that can be found is that the Post Office chose to cite philatelic pressure as the reason for the change. If, on the other hand, the stamp issuing program was compromised because of intimidation by a small but vociferous minority, then more has been lost than has been gained.

The great nineteenth century American theologian, Tryon Edwards, said "Compromise is but the sacrifice of one good in the hope of retaining another - too often ending in the loss of both." This concept has not changed in the last hundred years - but stamp collecting has.

MAJOR R.K. MALOTT ACCEPTS POSITION WITH CANADA WAR MUSEUM

Major "Dick" Malott, an officer in the Canadian Forces and also in the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada (Convention Co-ordinator) will soon be leaving active service to assume the position of Assistant Curator of the Canadian War Museum. He

will, of course, be staying in Ottawa and his philatelic activities will remain unaltered.

Those of us who have experienced Dick's organizational ability and boundless energy cannot help but feel that the Canadian War Museum will come out the winner by this appointment.

Early in January the Canada Post Office included an application for membership in the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada in a mailing to all those having a deposit account with the philatelic section. As a result we are now able to welcome almost 800 new members to the "Royal" - Canada's national philatelic society.

Many of the replies were in French and this turned my thoughts to the days, not long ago, when the late Louis Lamoureux was editor of the CANADIAN PHILATELIST. Even before bi-lingualism was being stressed as a national desirability, Louis made it a practice to include French content in most issues.

Although your present editor is not conversant in French, every effort will be made to reactivate the practice of previous years in future issues and thus allow all Canadian philatelists to pursue their hobby, at least to some degree, in the language with which they are most comfortable.

To all new members, a heartfelt WELCOME.

CANADA CENTENARY 1967 - 1973

The most delightfully involved set of stamps in Canadian philatelic history came out February 8, 1967 and it more or less ended almost 7 years later, October 17, 1973. In between, the 2 official printers, what with experimentation and unstable paper supplies, managed to expand the original 12 designs into no less than about 200 different basic stamps, creating a landslide chase for the elusive varieties all over Canada. Nor was the hunt restricted to only Canadians. Important British dealers recognizing an unprecedented situation, made special air trips and then ranged the country from one end to the other buying up whatever was available.

I did my share of the buying and have a fairly good stock but am not quite satisfied with it, so first of all will go on record that am in the market for any stocks of these Centenaries, in any shape or form as long as it's mint, and in face value from \$10.00 to \$100,000.00.

There ARE quantities of these around and both dealers and collectors will have a satisfying time of it uncovering rarer items, provided they have easy-to-follow guides as to what exists and what it is worth.

Am now at work on comprehensive PRICED catalog of the Centenary stamps. It will be incorporated in new editions of the Canada Basic Catalogue and the Canada Plate Block Catalogue. Publishing date uncertain as yet, but should be sometime in 1974. Due to paper shortages will have to restrict both editions to potential total of orders. No need to write in if you are already a customer; others had best indicate their wishes now. Both catalogs will be of the greatest interest as besides a very complete listing of the Centenaries, there will be described, listed and priced for the very first time anywhere, a number of major Canadian errors and varieties.

The \$100.00 SUPER PACK RAT LOT

Am still clearing out a vast accumulation of foreign odds and ends, acquired in over 50 years buying. In all that time my policy has been one and the same; buy all the Canadian stamps possible, but if the seller also happens to have collections or accumulations of foreign stamps, why never pass them up. And I sure didn't. Everything was purchased no matter how obscure. Trouble with this process, in time all available space gets plugged up with stamps. I've been selling off a lot over the past 10 years in \$2, \$10 and \$50 "Pack Rat" lots but it doesn't seem to have made much of a dent as visitors can testify.

So to speed up things am working on a series of \$100 "Super Pack-Rat" lots. If you spend at least \$100 a year on stamps it most certainly is worth your while to write in for full details and terms.

Next we come to suburban post offices farther out which had not joined the Montreal system, at least officially, by 1910. There follows a listing of those which were located in what were considered Montreal suburbs in city directories of the 1900's. Montreal Island was occupied by two counties: Hochelaga, taking up roughly the eastern half and Jacques Cartier to the west. Dates of opening are given and the address in 1910.

Hochelaga County

Ahuntsic, 1898. 6441 Lajeunesse (Fig 3). "Buck River Village" was incorporated as the Village of Ahuntsic in 1897. The name was that of a young Indian neophyte, martyred by the Iroquois in 1625, when he was thrown with Recollet Father Nicloas

Viel into the Sault-au-Recollet Rapids. The Village was annexed to Montreal in 1910.

Bordeaux, 1879. 2014 Chemin Gouin. It was named after Count Daeylar of Bordeaux, France, are of a group which bought the Jubinville farm in Sault-au-Recollet to subdivide into building lots.

Cote St. Michael, 1876. The village this post office was situated in, clustered around the Cote St. Michael Road, and the road from Cote Visitation to Sault-au-Recollet.

Cote Visitation 1876, 2430 Boulevard Rosemount. The name was already used back in 1707 for the community between Montreal and Cote St. Michel. It was incorporated as a Village in 1871, but was broken up into the Village of Delorimier and Petite Cote Village in 1895. The post office at the latter continued to be designated Cote Visitation. Both villages were later annexed by Montreal.

Long Point, 1851. Longue Pointe Fort appears on a 1702 map of Montreal Island. It became and incorporated municipality in 1845. General dealer, Jean B. Morin opened its post office. It became a town in 1907, but was annexed to Montreal in 1910. In the latter year its postal facility was located at 133 St. Just.

Maisonneuve, 1884 (Fig. 4). Formerly part of Hochelaga, it was incorporated in 1883, named for Paul de Chomedey, Sieur de Maisonneuve, founder of Montreal. Its post office was on Notre Dame Street, in the centre of town. In 1915 it became Montreal Postal Station M, and the municipality was taken over in 1918.

Montreal's last annexation of the time.

Sault-au-Recollet, 1847. 1086 Boulevard Gouin (Fig. 5). For the origin of its name see Ahuntsic. It became the Municipality of Sault-au-Recollet in 1855, a village in 1910 and a town in 1914, with annexation to Montreal in 1916.

Tetreatville, 1906. 4341 Honfleur Street. Pierre Tetreault's donation of a chapel gave it its name. The Parish of Sainte-Claire-de-Tetreatville was detached from Longue Pointe Parish in 1906, the Village of Tetreatville incorporated the next year and annexed to Montreal in 1910.

AND THE TWAIN SHALL MEET

For years the purists of one form of philately have looked askance - often with disdain - at those who do not pursue what they consider to be the classical approach. Thus, many postage stamp collectors consider revenue stamp collectors as people who, at best, must be only tolerated. However, what does one do when the two blend together?

This cover shows this union but, as one may expect, it is the result of unusual circumstances. This envelope (and enclosed letter) was mailed at Beaverton, Ontario on April 23, 1873 to a law firm in Toronto. It pertained to a dispute of ownership of a saw mill in the Beaverton area. Apparently the matter could not be settled without a lawsuit and this letter was presented as evidence in court.

The Ontario Law Stamp (issue of 1870) was affixed at the time and cancelled with a herring-bone scarifying cutter (not

evident in the photo). The oval mark over the corner of this stamp, dated February 1, 1878 is a court filing mark and shows the name of R.G. Dalton who was probably the court clerk.

Apparently the wheels of justice turned as slowly then as they do now for here we see a five year span between the initiation and the resolution of the problem.

REVISED STAMP PROGRAM FOR 1974

OTTAWA - Postmaster General Andre Ouellet today announced a revised 1974 Stamp Program for the Canada Post Office. The revised program introduces a new 7c. definitive stamp, a new 8c. commemorative stamp, and important changes in the 1974 Olympic stamp series.

The new program reduces the number of commemorative stamps to 33 from the 45 originally planned. The total cost to the collector of purchasing one of each commemorative stamp in 1974 will be reduced to \$2.99 from the \$5.42 it would have cost before the program was revised.

"We have revised our program in response to the many expressions of concern which we received from philatelists in Canada and abroad that Canada planned to issue too many stamps in 1974", said Mr. Ouellet.

The Canada Post Office will introduce a 7c. stamp to the low value definitive series. It will feature the late Louis St-Laurent who was Prime Minister of Canada from 1948 to 1957. Mr. St-Laurent was still alive when the choice of former Prime Ministers for this series issued last October was made. For this reason, he was not included in this series. The new 7c. stamp will be issued April 8.

This new stamp will meet a need. Two 7 cent stamps can be used for mail (1 to 2 ounces) at the first class rate of 14 cents and one 7 cent stamp combined with an 8c. stamp is the postage rate for overseas first class mail (1 ounce or less) at 15 cents.

An 8c. commemorative stamp to honour William Hamilton Merrit on the 150th anniversary of his founding of the Welland Canal will be issued on November 29, 1974.

Instead of issuing the 24 Olympic semi-postals (surcharged) stamps announced earlier, the Canada Post Office will be issuing only three semi-postals on

17 April 1974, together with two issues of four commemorative 8c. stamps in March and September, 1974.

The new Olympic commemorative stamps will introduce a world first in stamp design. A new patented engraving technique has been employed which provides a "latent" or "hidden image" of the 1976 Olympic Games symbol in the stamp. The image only becomes visible when the stamp is held obliquely towards a light source.

The Olympic commemorative stamps issued on 22 March, 1974 will feature four designs on one sheet showing Canadian participating in typically Canadian sports or activities - hiking, bicycling, swimming and jogging. The issue on 23 September will similarly feature four winter activities - skiing, snow-shoeing, curling and skat-

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ing. The designs emphasize the fun and "keep fit" aspect of truly amateur sport.

The semi-postals which will be issued April 17 will employ the very popular design used on the first Olympic commemoratives issued September 20, 1973, but will offer philatelists the unique opportunity of seeing these designs in three different interpretations, and in a different size.

The bronze coloured 8 cent stamp will have a 2 cent surcharge, the silver coloured 10 cent stamp will have a 5 cent surcharge, as will the gold coloured 15 cent stamp. This surcharge will be paid to the organizing committee of the Olympic Games to help support the 1976 Summer Olympics in Canada.

Naturally for those who do not wish to participate in the financing of the Games, it will be possible to buy, at any Post Office, regular definitive or other commemorative stamps without a surcharge.

The 8 cent stamp commemorating the international championship of cycling will be issued August 7, seven days before the event which will be held in Montreal. Its issue was originally planned for April 10.

The Postmaster General also said that the Canada Post Office will continue in 1975 its series on the Olympic Games and that a commemorative stamp for Marguerite Bourgeoys, founder of the Order of Notre-Dame, will be issued on the 275th anniversary of her death.

RARE HAND CANCELLER FOUND

OTTAWA - A rare find in the form of a cut-down version of a squared-circle cancelling hammer has been acquired by the Canada Post Office for its proposed National Postal Museum. In announcing the find, Jim Kraemer, Manager of the Museum said: "This is a very important addition to the museum and one that will be a highlight of the collection".

The hammer, located in Nanaimo, B.C., is only one of three that are known to have existed - one in Bobcaygeon, Ontario, another in Schreiber, Ontario and the third in Nanaimo, B.C.. Both the Bobcaygeon and Schreiber cancellers are believed to have been lost or destroyed.



This cut-down version is reduced to a broken-line circle, the horizontal bars and side pieces of the original squared-circle design having been removed, probably by turning it in a lathe.

The squared-circle design consists of a circle bearing the name of the town and date. From the perimeter of the circle a surround of horizontal bars and vertical side pieces squares the face of the

canceller so that it produces a square postmark. The letters on these old hammers were hand-cut, making for wide variations in letter shape.



There were once more than 250 cancellors of this type in use across the country.

Because of the relatively large printing surface on the face of the square-circle cancellor, some postmasters and postal clerks probably found that it required considerable force to hand stamp a clear postmark. This may explain why some offices used this type of hammer only occasionally.

It may also explain why three offices, Bobcaygeon, Schreiber and Nanaimo removed the surround bars and side-pieces entirely, leaving only the circular portion of the design enclosed by dashed circular lines as the sole remnants of the original bars and side pieces.

The squared-circle Nanaimo cancellor was proofed on July 26, 1893, and its earliest known use was on August 13, 1893. Its last known use in this form was on December 23, 1896.

The earliest known postmark of the cut-down version appeared on December 30, 1896. The cancellor was last used in 1955.

NEW POLICY ON PHILATELIC PRODUCTS

OTTAWA - Postmaster General Andre Ouellet today announced that effective 1 February, 1974, the following policies with respect to philatelic and retail product sales and services will be implemented.

Stamps will be sold at all philatelic counters as sheets, plate block sets and combination or sets singles in a prepack-

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aged format for customer convenience and to protect the product quality, without additional charge, for a period of 12 months only following their dates of issue.

All stamps, commencing January 1974, will bear the year of issue and a copyright mark.

Customers will have until 28 February, 1974 to purchase stamps issued prior to 1 February, 1973.

Semi-annual packs of single stamps and topicals or thematics, where appropriate, will be sold for a period of 12 months following the date of availability.

Annual Souvenir Collections of definitive, commemorative, special sets and thematic or topical sets will be available for 24 months following date of issue. These are specially packaged with attractive presentation folders and bear a small surcharge over the face value of the stamps.

Official First Day Covers will be sold at philatelic counters and by mail order in the following format: single stamp on F.D.C., combination of current issue, plate block (choice of 4 corners), plain block or pair of two stamps of same design and denomination. Official First Day Covers will be sold for six months following day of issue. Semi-annual convenience package of official First Day Covers will be available in the single combination format for a period of 12 months following the date of availability. The selling price of official First Day Covers will remain at 20c., plus the postage value purchased.

A plate block, regardless of the stamp denomination, may be purchased as four stamps. Effective 1 March, 1974, this policy will also apply to all past issues still on sale. It is no longer necessary to purchase more than four stamps to obtain a corner block for stamp denominations below 10c.

Cash orders by mail must be paid in Canadian dollars and the total value of the order must be one dollar or more. There is, however, no minimum order limit for Collector's Subscription Service (formerly known as a Deposit Account) customers and payment to subscription accounts will be accepted in both Canadian and U.S.

currency. Minimum deposit for Collector's Subscription Service is \$20 Canadian.

First Day Cancellation will, from time to time, be elsewhere than Ottawa where the stamp issue has some outstanding association with a specific location (e.g. the centennial of a major city). The F.D.C. site will be revealed with the announcement of the stamp issue.

First Day Cancellation and delivery will be available at the official First Day Cancellation site for customers' own First Day Covers for a service charge of 15c. if the Canada Post Office affixes the postage and if the postage purchased is less than 50c. The service charge will be 10c. where the customer has purchased and affixed the postage in advance. The minimum order limitation of \$1 will not apply to this service.

Mail order forms are available at all philatelic counters and at most regular Post Offices. Mail orders and payment for all philatelic products and services may be made through any local post office or by writing directly to Philatelic Service Philatelique, Poste Canada Post, Ottawa, Canada, K1A 0B5.

We mentioned last time that there has been a reduction of booklet requirements by the public and that some countries are discontinuing them. We now hear that the Canadian booklets have gone down in sale by almost double but that the coils have increased by more than three times.

+++++++

The increased interest in Postal Stationery produces new items almost every month. Some of these are not normally available at the Post Office. The lack of control over the issue of such items from all sorts of private businesses is unfortunate not only from the collectors' view but from the taxpayers' view as well. I guess one can call the Express Message cards for delivery more or less official but even here we note many varieties which were obviously not in accordance with postal regulations. We hear that there will be much stricter control soon and regulations to that effect are now being developed.

+++++++

For years collectors and dealers have bought their new issues shortly after they appeared, to fill their initial requirements. Dealers or collectors who wanted to add additional items of that issue to their stock of collection, purchased these if and when needed over the following years from the Post Office. The lists of available material extended back for many years. Now, a new policy will come into effect. Any stamp, not for the regular issue, such as the commemoratives will be kept for sale by the Post Office for a maximum of one year and then the remainders will be destroyed. So you better have enough cash handy to cover your requirements for your lifetime once the stamp is issued.

+++++++

The new book by Mr. K. Pugh which deals with Canadian Varieties of recent issues mentions for the first time, as far as we know, the existence of the inverted offset doubling on the Seaway Stamp. Although the writer and others knew about this for many years, it appears that there was a reluctance to list this variety. As you know the doubling is listed as if there was a double print and the prices asked are in accordance with this type of variety. But the writer and others did point out before that this is only an offset, not a double print. The Bank Note Company confirmed this. Now with the news out that the doubling also exists inverted, there can be no doubt anymore by anyone that this is an offset not a double print. The price as indicated in Mr. Pugh's book is realistic for such a nice offset. Congratulations for bringing this and many other interesting varieties to our attention.

+++++++

The controversy about the first day of usage for the new one Dollar stamp continues. We know now that the Post Office supplied this new stamp to the Toronto Post Office on the 19th. Next day, a Saturday, the PO was closed. No sale on the 20th or 21st. So the first time they could have been used was on the 22nd. But we will wait and listen. I do agree though with

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all collectors that the day of issue should have been announced, because this stamp is not just a reprint of another plate but a completely new stamp in every respect. When a new die of stamp is issued in Europe or the U.S.A. this is fully announced by the P.O. And why not?

+++++++

Now that the Winnipeg tagging experiment has been stopped and the machine being sold, we wonder if the remainders of the Winnipeg tagged stamps will be destroyed. If you will miss some of the last issue with this tagging, you are advised to get them now.

+++++++

Photography of postage stamps is difficult, especially if a sharp, clear reproduction is required. Colour photography is even more difficult. With perfect equipment it is possible to prepare an original in colour which is good but the problem immediately arises when trying to make copies of the original. Until recently we have not seen satisfactory reproductions of originals. Coloured journals, catalogues and books have, in many cases, reproductions which do not match the original photo or stamps. Rather expensive books have been released which mislead the uninformed with regards to stamp shades. Our eye was attracted to the superb reproductions in one book and sheets for some special stamp events in Switzerland. Here every copy displayed the same clear and very accurate colour of the actual stamp. We hear that a very special, new process allows Fretz. Co. in Zurich to do just this.

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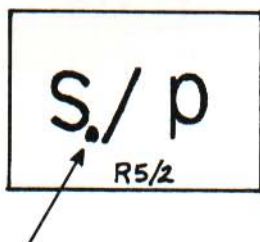
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UNDER THE LOOKING GLASS

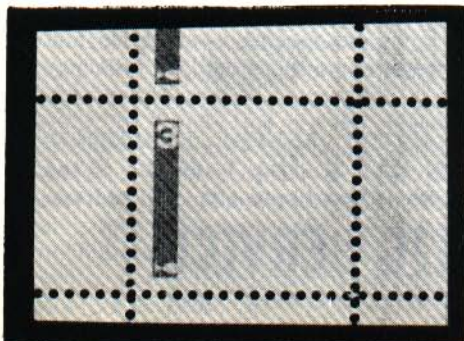
In an earlier article I made mention of the 1972 Vancouver Dollar Sign Variety. Since that time M.S. Sekersky of Windsor, Ontario has brought to my attention that a minor variety exists on stamp R5-2.



Between the -s- of postes and the - symbol, a triangular shaped dot may be found. He has also noted this variety on fifty sheets in his area, and all the sheets I have seen here in Brandon also contain this variety.

I would place a value of approximately \$7.00 for this variety, mainly due to the fact that the 'Short Dollar Sign' variety (valued at \$5.00) is also on this stamp.

Since this stamp may also be found with either smooth or ribbed paper, the value may also be set by the scarcity of either paper. At this time of writing the ribbed paper appears to be the more scarce of the two, but it is a little early to tell.



Another member of the Winnipeg Philatelic Society, Ralph Huuk, sent me a most unusual offset on the 1962-64 Definitive Issue. A full pane of 100 of the 3 cent value, Winnipeg tagged, showed a vertical offset strip of 10 on the reverse of stamp positions R1-10-10.



Have you ever seen a 'fleyspeck' which has all the characteristics of a real fly? Take a close look at position R5-1 of the 6 cent White Throated Sparrow Issue of 1968. On many panes, a large red dot appears to be poised just outside the open beak of the sparrow! Upon close examination 'under the looking glass' the dot appears to be

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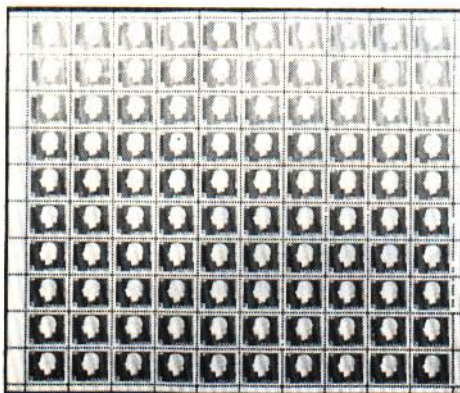
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The Rev. David Prowse sent an interesting photo of a 'dry inking' variety on the 1954 Definitive Issue - 6 cent value.

ED NOTE: It is my understanding that a dry plate printing occurs when insufficient ink is deposited on the plate thus producing stamps that are deficient in both colour intensity and design definition. In a worn plate the grooves (or dots) hold less ink and, although the colour is less vivid than usual, the design still maintains a reasonable degree of clarity. Also, printings from worn plates maintain a constancy.

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The London Letter

POSTAL HISTORY A GROWING HOBBY

Philately is the Science of Stamp Collecting and Postal History is the Humanity.

The letters that the post brought you this morning are the latest chapter and if you examine the envelopes carefully, you might readily discover a fact about the postal service that is new to you.

Fifty years ago there were three collectors in England who were interested in old letters, particularly those bearing the old handstamps of the post. The uninitiated called these stamps "post-marks" but from 1661, when they were first introduced for use in London by the then P.M.G., the Post Office called these impressions "stamps", (origin "stempel" - a short sharp blow).

Today there are probably between five and eight thousand collectors in the United Kingdom who include these fore-runners of the adhesive stamp in their specialised studies.

To be of the maximum interest, such letters should be entire, i.e. not only the outer letter sheet bearing the address and any handstamps, but also the original letter.

If one has an enquiring mind, one can usually learn something about the life and character of the writer, trace how the letter was carried, (foot-post, mounted post boy, mail coach, train, sailing or steamship, etc.), whether the postage was prepaid or collected on delivery and, if from overseas, there may be some indication of how the postage was apportioned between the countries and carriers. For instance, an early letter of the nineteenth century from Yorktown (now Toronto) in Canada could show the Canadian postage, the cost of ferriage across the river at Niagara, the American

postage to Boston, the sea postage to Liverpool, the internal postage in England with a local delivery charge and possibly a gratuity paid to the ship's captain. If the letter was addressed to Scotland, there would be the "Additional ½d." handstamp covering the border toll on the mail coach.

A month ago I was in Calgary and bought a letter written in 1841 from Huntingdon by a father to his younger son who had emigrated to Canada. From the contents I learned that England was shocked at the report of the defeat of the British Army in Afghanistan when only Dr. Brydon survived. They were worried about the outcome of the Opium War in China. Father sent the letter down to London by private carrier so that his eldest son could add his family news. The latter had given the letter to the Post Office receiver in Pall Mall, from whom it had been collected and taken to the G.P.O. From there it had travelled by coach (or rail? - this must be checked up) to Liverpool where it had been put on one of Sam Cunard's new Post Office Packets and taken to Halifax, Nova Scotia. Probably a mounted post boy had then taken the letter across the Colony to St. John, New Brunswick, from whence it had been carried up the road built sixty years earlier to Montreal.

Many collectors in this country specialize in a study of the postal service of their own town or county. Some collect letters delivered by the London Penny Post which was set up in 1680. Others like ship letters, i.e. those from overseas which had to be handed in to the Post Office by the ship's captain when he made his first land fall in the United Kingdom. Such letters bear a handstamp with the name of the port and the words "Ship Letter".

There are many attractive facets to this hobby. One makes one's own collection without having to follow in the footsteps of others. It is not difficult to choose a theme.

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Some consider an aspect of their own lives and it is probable that ninety per cent of the members of the Forces Postal History Society served during World War II with the Armed Forces. After he was demobilized, the soldier came home to find that his parents or his wife had kept all his letters. The handstamps or cancellations were usually of an Army or a Field Post Office. He remembered that he was in Cairo when this letter was written and in Benghazi six weeks later. The number of the Field Post Office now means something to him and correspondence with members of his old regiment helps him to reconstruct the movement of the campaigns.

A family association, a favourite period in history, an exciting event such as the letter that the late Francis Chichester carried found the world for one in Gipsy Moth, can start one off collecting letters to and from explorers, navigators and those pioneers who went into outlandish parts where there was no postal service. Two of my treasures are dirty and aged letters carried in 1863 by African messengers from Cape Town to Doctor Livingstone's Nyassaland Expedition. They walked about 3,700 miles to deliver their master's letters.

A bomb drops on Damascus, but here is a letter written in that fair city just five hundred years ago. A trireme must have taken it to Rhodes where a Venetian Galley took it up to Zara in the Adriatic. But these are the thoughts of a dilettante, many make serious studies of certain subjects like the late Ravasini's collection of disinfected letters. Bubonic plague and cholera caused immense precautions to be taken to disinfect all letters coming from the East - at Malta, Zante, all over Italy and the Adriatic ports, up north over the alps to Austria and Germany, letters were fumigated in the forlorn hope of preventing the spread of the epidemic. "PURIFIE AU LAZARET" was a typical handstamp on such a letter, but I prefer the charming Italian phrase "clean inside and out".

Today, postal history is studied by thousands in many countries. There are "study groups", membership of which

implies that one pools one's knowledge with one's fellow members to the advantage of all. There are learned societies of larger groups who study a variety of subjects. Rarely a month passes without another monograph or text book on some curious aspect of postal history being published.

With advancing years, many serious philatelists find that their eye-sight is not so keen and close study of the stamp under magnification becomes a strain. Collecting is in the blood and postal history gives the maximum for mental enquiry and relaxation with the minimum of strain. The many subjects that crop up in the course of one's investigations, social science is one of the most interesting, are added attractions.

Just supposing you could find two letters written from Sinai recently, one by an Egyptian soldier and one by an Israeli, you would have found a postal history gem - yet there must be thousands of such letters. How were they carried? How did they reach their destination? How did you find them?

THE CHAPTER COORDINATOR -----

For the benefit of new members of the Society who are receiving the Canadian Philatelist for the first time I would like to give a brief resume of my Department. I act as the liaison officer between the Society and the Stamp Clubs and Philatelic Societies who are affiliated with it as Chapters. Any Club, providing they meet certain basic requirements, may apply for Chapter affiliation. The basic requirements are:

At least three (3) Club members must be members of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada; Chapter dues of \$5.00 for the current year must accompany the application (if application is made after 1st of June fees for the balance of the year are \$3.00); the Club must appoint a Chapter Representative to act as the liaison officer between the Club and the Society - this officer MUST be a member of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada; once a year the Club must submit an annual report to the Executive Secretary of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada, and this report should include such details as when and where meetings are held, Officers of the Club, number of members and a short account of the activities of the club.

Services which the Society offers its Chapters are:

Participation in the Society Sales Circuit - for Chapters outside the major centres this has the obvious advantage of bringing in material its members normal-

ly wouldn't have access to; Slide programmes - at the present time the Society has over 60 programmes on coloured 35 mm slides on a wide variety of philatelic topics, these are available to the Chapters from me at a rental fee of \$2.00 per programme; The Society also has lectures on various philatelic subjects available; Each Chapter, through the Chapter Representative, receives a copy of the Canadian Philatelist when it is published for the Chapter Library; Chapter Medals for use as awards at Club exhibitions or other Club events are available from me at \$1.50 each, these medals come in gold, silver and bronze finishes.

These are some of the advantages which come to a Club as a Chapter of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada. If you are a member of a Stamp Club not presently affiliated with the "Royal" as a Chapter and would like more information as to how to join, please drop me a line at 192 Shanty Bay Road, Barrie, Ontario. L4M 1E6. I'll be pleased to hear from you.

The following is directed to the established Chapters:

At the November Directors meeting the following change in section 6 of the Slide Library Regulations was approved:

"Slide programmes must be returned within 3 days of your meeting so that they are available to other Chapters. They must be returned either via Registered First Class Mail or via Parcel Post insured for a

at least \$50.00. In the event that a slide programme being returned goes missing in the mails and the Chapter concerned has not complied with the above instructions, the Chapter will be held responsible for the replacement cost of the slide programme less any indemnity paid by the Post Office Department for an uninsured parcel."

Several Chapters have appointed as Chapter Representatives Club Members who are not Members of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada. This is a violation of Section 4 of the Chapter Regulations and it is hoped that the Chapters concerned will rectify this situation immediately either by ensuring that the new Representative joins the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada or by appointing another Representative who is a member.

The Society has had Chapter membership certificates printed, these are suitable for framing and will be sent out to the Chapters very shortly along with the new slide programme and lecture lists.

Mrs. Geldert has asked me to remind all Chapters of the special rate for listing Chapter meetings in the Canadian philate-

list. This is \$2.00 per issue or \$12.00 per year, interested Chapters are asked to direct their inquiries to her at 195 Clearview Avenue, Apt. 1510, Ottawa, Ontario. K1Z 6S1.

THE COORDINATOR OF YOUTH ACTIVITIES



This logo which has been adopted by F.I.P. (Federation of International Philately) shows 1974 to be the INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF YOUTH PHILATELY. The R.P.S.C., a member of F.I.P. has always stressed the importance of encouraging young collectors and has been actively engaged to this end.

The Youth Program distributed this school year some 20 boxes of stamps. Stamps, as in the past, came from commercial establishments as well as

individuals. The distribution is made of the materials received without checking so that the value or contents of the packets cannot be ascertained. In several cases requests were made for specific countries or topics. While the first is relatively easy to satisfy the second is nearly impossible.

We are maintaining a link with the Post Office Department and hope to cooperate with them fully when their school program begins to operate shortly.

COME, BLOW YOUR HORN was again in demand this year. Our supply of English copies is nearly exhausted and the French edition met with equal success. The English editions (3) totaled 1,000 copies while the French was printed only once with 400 copies made available. There are no plans at this moment to reprint either edition unless there is a

substantial demand. Plans are being made for a new philatelic game to be made available next Fall.

In our liaison with the Youth Commission of the FIP we have received some excellent materials and support. In addition to several international exhibitions in which our young people will participate: Jerusalem '73 (March 1974) and Mladost (Bulgaria, May 1974), we will have youth sections at Winnipeg in May and later that month at Toronto Stampex. At this last show we are cooperating with the Junior Philatelic Association of the U.S.

No special project was undertaken in connection with the International Philatelic Youth Year due to the fact that the purpose of this office is mainly assistance to young people and we do not have a steady membership.

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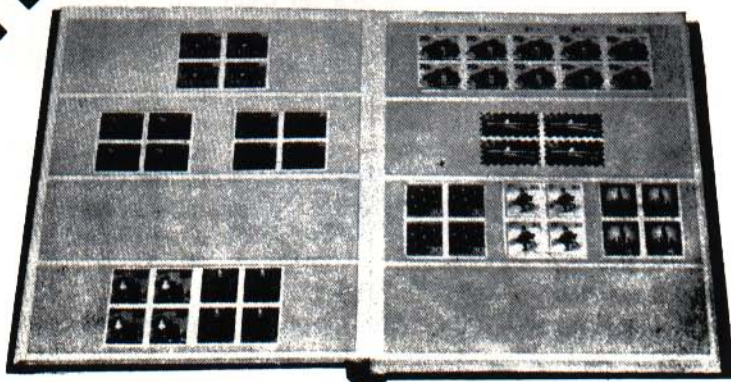

MACABRE STAMPS - Part 1

I would like to propose the macabre as a new topic for collectors. To qualify as macabre a stamp must, in my definition, combine two features. First the subject depicted must be brutally tragic - and second the design stark and unidealized; in short, it must be a gruesome stamp. It is not enough that the subject depicted or commemorated be macabre.

To illustrate this concept I will refer to some issues of stamps inspired by two tragedies of World War II. First is the Warsaw Ghetto uprising of the spring of 1943. Survivors' accounts of this ten day battle always stress the thirst, starvation, pain and desperation of the fighters and are almost too painful to read. Clearly the subject matter qualifies as "brutally tragic."

However, of the three stamps mentioned in this article that depict this event only the first one qualifies as macabre. In 1948 Poland issued 346,700 copies of a stamp designed by J. Tom to commemorate the fifth anniversary of the uprising

(figure 1). Its sombre colour, the pain and emaciation of the man and woman combatants evoke the terrible reality of those few days. However, the 1963 Polish issue (figure 2) no longer stinks of death; the fighter (except for his mouth) is idealized; he is wounded but spotless. Twenty-five years after the event, Israel released a single showing a statue from the Warsaw Ghetto memorial (figure 3). Neither is it macabre; something of the tragedy is expressed, but none of the brutality.

The Nazi extermination camps provide the subject for the second illustration. Again Poland furnishes the first example and the only truly macabre stamp of the group, a 1946 semi-postal showing the camp at Maidanek (figure 4). J. Wilczyk, the designer of this photogravure stamp, has created something appropriately hideous. The detail of the design is fine enough to enable one to read "CYKLON

The New Zealand Post Office commemorates two notable centenaries.

II" on the cylinder that the leering skeleton in the SS helmet and the greatcoat is pouring over the camp. Cyklon II was the insecticide that was used in the death chambers, and the prussian green colour of the stamp suggests a poisonous atmosphere. What makes this a consummately macabre design is the contrast between the figure of death in the sky and the every day banality of the camp scene below. Only 218,000 were issued.

In 1967 and 1968 Poland issued sets of stamps to honour the memory of her people martyred in the war, and some of the 1967 set come close to the macabre. For example, the Zagan memorial stamp (figure 5) includes a representation of a victim, but these stamps are too pretty to qualify. The 1973 Israel "holocaust" issue (figure 6) does not meet the criteria as it is too stylized. On the whole, its design fails to do justice to the subject.

In thinking about these two catas-

trophes and the stamp they inspired, I have noted that they follow a similar pattern. The further in time from the event the less gruesome is the stamp. This might be because in time men tend to forget or to repress the worst details of horrible experiences. Thus the later issues emphasize the hope that the suffering of the victims was not in vain whilst the earlier are anguished cries of despair.

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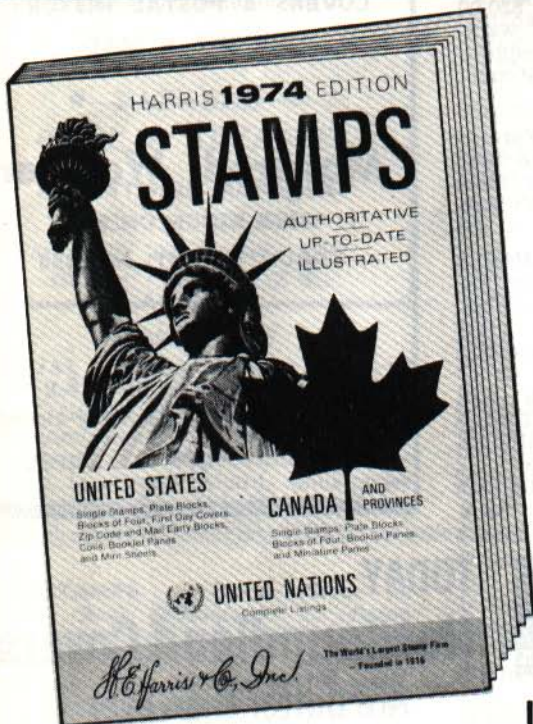
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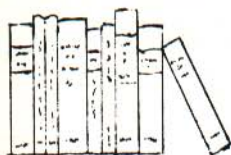
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Of course, the overprinting was unauthorized and the IRPO was using British-issued stamps in Northern Ireland for propaganda purposes. However, Irish and British philatelic specialists seem concerned that in future years some of these IRPO overprints might find a different status, almost similar to the so-called Fenian essays, which today have been commanding high premium plus respectability.

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As a new member of the R.P.S.C. I must say that I enjoyed the copies of the CANADIAN PHILATELIST received to date and was very much interested in the address by the Postmaster General (of Canada) in the latest issue.

I have one comment on the address where he states "a stamp is a jack-of-all-trades ... not just a collectors item, it plays the role of ambassador, teacher and statesman". I would like to suggest that a lot could be done to improve this aspect of the stamp by a few changes in the way stamps are cancelled.

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I receive a lot of mail from Great Britain and New Zealand and in most cases the circular date stamp follows the slogan portion and almost always fall on the stamp (see illustration).

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
