The free offer announced in the July/August issue swamped the National Office and complete sets as previously announced are no longer available. However, the official 100-page international catalogue is still available for \$1 postage and handling. Please send your request to the National Office indicating your membership number. TAKE A "POSTIE" TO LUNCH

Collectors of Canada Post's official philatelic and retail products may wish to befriend their local postal clerk or letter carrier. All employees of the Canada Post Corporation receive an employee-discount on a wide range of products, including coins from the Royal Canadian Mint. For example, the \$14.95 Aircraft Heritage Collection is available at \$12.70 while the 1983 Souvenir Collection, retailing at \$24.95 is employee discounted to \$22.95. This would appear to be a relatively "new" policy as employees of the old Post Office Department were never given that privilege.

One hopes that the discount program has a secure monitoring system in place, as too often in the past postal employees were part-time dealers in Canadian varieties and this would appear to be a perfect opportunity to become full-time dealers in Canadian philatelic products.

CANADA POST AND THE COLLECTOR

Canada Post has announced that philatelic gross sales for 1982-83 were \$22.6 million, hardly a "nickel-and-dime" operation. With the bad press that Canada Post has been receiving lately from collectors and R.P.S.C. members, it would appear that no matter what they do wrong, they are still making a huge sum of money. I guess when you have a monopoly operation grossing over \$22 million in change, you don't really have to listen to your customers ... or do you?

BANGKOK '83

Congratulations on behalf of the Society are extended to the Canadian medal winners at Bangkok '83: Major Malott was awarded a Gold medal for his semi-official airmails; Dave Dixon received a Silver medal for his Saint John, N.B. cancellations post-Confederation; Michael Millar was awarded a Silver-Bronze medal for his exhibit of English pre-adhesive markings; and Gregory Madesker received a Bronze medal for his exhibit of locomotives in the Youth Section.

The only untoward note of Bangkok '83 was the tragic and sudden death, by reason of heart attack, of Charles Stewart, one of the principle organizers of the show. It was a tri-

bute both to him and the remaining members of the Committee that events proceeded so smoothly.

F.I.P. EXHIBITION REGULATIONS

Many members may be unfamiliar with the F.I.P. and with AMERIPEX '86 in Chicago and CAPEX '87 in Toronto approaching quickly, here are a few guidelines with regard to F.I.P.-sponsored international exhibitions:

Exhibition Objectives

- 1.1 The F.I.P. sees in philatelic exhibitions a suitable opportunity according to Article 5 of its Statutes
 - to expand and develop friendly relations and close co-operation between philatelists the world over, and thus to make a contribution to the consolidation of peace and to better understanding among all people,
 - to demonstrate the state of development of philately in all its various fields,
 - to promote international exchange of the results of philatelic research,
 - to awaken the interest of philatelists in international competitions, and
 - to demonstrate to the general public, in particular to the youth, the cultural values of philately and its attractiveness as a hobby.

Types of Exhibitions:

In accordance with Article 1 of these regulations, the F.I.P. promotes all of the following types of philatelic exhibitions:

- 2.1 World Exhibitions:
 - 2.1.1– General World Exhibitions for all exhibit classes mentioned in Article 4 and open to participation by all F.I.P. member federations.
 - 2.1.2– Specialized World Exhibitions restricted to one or several exhibition classes and open to participation by all F.I.P. member federations.
- 2.2 International Exhibitions:
 - 2.2.1– General International Exhibitions restricted to continental or regional participation of member federations in all exhibition classes.
 - 2.2.2– Specialized International Exhibitions restricted to continental or regional participation of member federations in one or several exhibition classes.
- 2.3 Other Exhibitions
 - Other exhibitions of international interest

recognized and supported by the F.I.P. Board of Directors.

R.P.S.C. CONVENTIONS

The members who have been listed as having won awards at international F.I.P. exhibitions have of course not started exhibiting at that level. Members are encouraged to exhibit at their local club level and then once a year you have the opportunity of exhibiting your collection at the annual R.P.S.C. Convention. The 1984 Convention is being held 18 - 20 May in Quebec City and members are encouraged to attend, not only those who wish to exhibit, but all members who want to take advantage of the opportunity of seeing the best that fellow members have to offer. Further information can be obtained from Director Guy des Rivières in Quebec City.

OBITUARY --

LT. COL. FREDERICK E. EATON

One of Canada's leading stamp dealers and long time member of the R.P.S.C., Fred Eaton, passed away at his home in Vancouver on 14 July 1983.

Formerly a Commanding Officer of the Vancouver regiment of the Irish Fusiliers of Canada, Col. Eaton served in W.W. II in Jamaica and Holland. In 1956 he founded the Stanley Stamp Co. in Vancouver, later forming the F.E. Eaton Co. Col. Eaton was an authority on the stamps forged by the late André Frodel, considered by many to be one of the world's expert forgers of rare stamp varieties. The National Postal Museum has Col. Eaton's tape recording of Mr. Frodel's career in its library.

Condolences on behalf of the entire Society are extended to his wife Dianne and four sons.

OBITUARY -- FRANK LINDSAY

Retired R.C.M.P. Commissioner and Vice-President of Interpol, Frank Lindsay of Ottawa died on 3 May 1983. A native of Arkona, Ontario, Mr. Lindsay rose through the ranks of the R.C.M.P. to head the force as Commissioner from 1967 to 1969.

Active as an executive of the Ottawa Philatelic Society and the R.C.M.P. Stamp Club, Mr. Lindsay often told the story of buying an 8¢ registered stamp in 1917 at the Kirkfield post office for the sum of 8¢. The Society's condolences are extended to his wife Diana and his family.

OBITUARY -- DOUGLAS A. PATRICK

Canadian philately lost one of its staunchest proponents when Douglas A. Patrick passed away on 26 September 1983. In his broad-

casts and writings Doug Patrick probably reached more stamp collectors than any other person in Canada. His weekly CBC Stamp Club of the Air ran for over 20 years and was one of the longest continuing broadcasts in Canadian radio. He wrote the weekly stamp column in the Globe & Mail for over 33 years and was Philatelic Curator of the Royal Ontario Museum.

Doug's approach to the hobby was unique. He refused to have any part in buying and selling stamps, leaving that to the professionals. He carefully guarded his "amateur" status, becoming a Fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society of London and a Fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada.

In addition to his pioneer work in philatelic broadcasting and newspaper work, he published 10 books with the tireless support and assistance of his wife, Mary. Douglas Patrick will be missed by thousands of friends, listeners and readers. □

CANADIAN FORTS BOOKLETS

To obtain a used pane of the Canada Forts booklet stamps, place the entire pane on a #10 envelope including the printers imprint on the left-hand side. To do this, cut the cardboard under the selvedge imprint, moisten the stamps and attach to the envelope using glue to attach the cardboard. When soaking the used entire pane, the cardboard under the imprint will detach.

When using these individual stamps on mail, be sure to include the tab with the stamp. To get a circular dated cancel, place the centre of the stamp approximately 3 inches from the right-hand edge of the envelope, and if the tab is at the top, make certain it is not more than 1/8 of an inch from the top edge of the envelope.

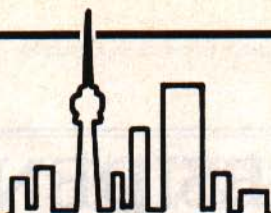

If you have a complaint or dispute relating to some transaction between yourself and another collector or dealer, our Complaint or Arbitration Committees are available to offer advice and/or assistance.

The Co-ordinator of our Youth Education Programme is more than willing to advise on setting up this type of a programme in your locality. This programme is designed to create an interest in philately among young people, and to offer continuing guidance to those who may become the serious collectors of the future.

Many special services are available to Chapters to assist in the planning of programmes for their meetings with the use of specially prepared philatelic slide programmes or lectures. There are also guidelines for planning exhibitions, or even our annual convention, should your locality wish to host this event. Chapters may even advertise under CHAPTER MEETINGS, in The Canadian

Philatelist, at a special rate. Is your Chapter listed?

All these services and many others are available to you as members of the Society. Why not become an active member, by using the service or services that might best help you to enjoy your hobby to the utmost, and at the same time you will become a Society supporter, rather than just a card-carrying member. By your support and use of the many services offered, your Executive can evaluate the services offered and continue to formulate ideas and expand services when and where needed.

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Highlights From The Early Days of The Cunard Line

XXIII. The Persia

By the time that the **Arabia** was built, Cunard had decided that the days of wooden steamships of any size was past; which accounts for the sale of her sister ship (the original **Arabia**) to the R.W.I.M.P. Early in 1853, the company bought two iron screw steamships, the **Australian** (318 feet long, 6,410 tons) and the **Sydney** (230 feet long, 3,200 tons), that were originally built for the Australian service, but which did not succeed because of coaling difficulties. These were followed by the **Andes** and the **Alps** (230 feet long, 1,275 tons) to make a fleet of four emigrant vessels for service to Boston, each with accommodation for 200 persons. Their obvious success in the "second class trade" is shown by the addition of two more, the **Jura** in 1854 and the **Etna** in 1855 (300 feet long, 2,200 tons). The last four named above served in the transport service in the Mediterranean during the Crimean War, returning afterwards to the Atlantic service.

With the end of the Crimean War in sight, the time was ripe for planning to regain the Blue Riband from the Collins Line, which the **Arabia** had failed to do. To this end, an order was placed with Robert Napier in 1855 for an iron hull paddlewheeler, which was to be very much larger and more powerful than the three A's, and was expected to be faster. Prior to this, the British government had required that the Cunard contract steamers be wooden, in case they should be required for military purposes. Presumably the satisfactory service rendered in the Mediterranean by the iron screw steamers removed this restriction.

The **Persia** was completed by the end of the year and on 8 January 1856, a trial run from Greenock to Holy Island and back was made with (as the Halifax **Nova Scotian** re-

ported),

about 250 ladies and gentlemen including many of the most distinguished persons in Scotland ..., who were conveyed by special train from Glasgow to Greenock. These were received on board the **Persia** by Commodore Judkins, the band of the Renfrushire Militia, which was on board, playing "Rule Britannia". The day was all that could be desired.

The first part of the trip was given over to sightseeing, with the ship cruising at about half speed along the far shore of the river to let the guests admire the scenery. Full power was then put on for a run over the 15½ mile measured distance between the Clock Lighthouse and Cumbrae Lighthouse, which was accomplished in 58 minutes, with the paddles turning at 17 revolutions per minute. After passing the latter point, the engines were reduced to half-speed and the company sat down to a magnificent banquet.

About 170 sat down in the aft, and 50 in the fore saloon. George Brown, Esq., filled the chair, and John Burns, Esq., and Captain Judkins officiated as croupiers. Grace was said by the Dean of Ripon, and after dinner by the Rev. Mr. Macleod. The loyal and patriotic toasts drunk, the Chairman gave the health of Mr. Cunard, prefacing with high eulogiums on that gentleman, to whose energies the line was indebted for much of its success. Mr. Cunard was not present. A great variety of other toasts were drunk with enthusiasm, including the Collins' line, which had since the commencement of the war co-operated with the Cunard

line in carrying the mails. In responding to his health, the Hon. and Rev. Dean of Ripon stated that it was 48 years since he had accompanied Robert Fulton on the first trial trip of the first steamer that ever sailed in the world. At 4:00 p.m. the steamer **Vulcan** took off the party, who returned to Glasgow.

Having been cleared of guests, steam was got up and the **Persia** headed out for Liverpool at full speed at 4:35 p.m. on the same day. The ship was running light with about 300 tons of coal on board and drawing 18 feet of water aft. The trip from the Clock Light to the Liverpool Bell Buoy took 10 hours 43 minutes, and was the shortest on record. This was achieved in spite of shutting off one of the boilers for three quarters of an hour near the halfway mark, forcing a reduction in the speed of the engines from 18 to 14 revolutions per minute, and of having to take evasive action to avoid vessels; it was estimated that the running time was increased by at least half an hour because of this. Notwithstanding, the trip was "truly extraordinary, it being nearly five hours under the ordinary time." The distance covered was 175 nautical miles or 203 statute miles, at an average speed of 16 knots or 19 m.p.h. She was met at the Huskisson Dock in Liverpool by a number of dignitaries, and another banquet was spread with many toasts.

Because of her increased boiler capacity, the **Persia** had two funnels and produced quite a pyrotechnic display during the overnight run to Liverpool. As the newspaper reported:

The "soft" Scotch coal was used to generate steam on the trial trip. This coal is not as well adapted to steamboat use as the Cardiff coal, which generates more steam and makes no smoke, and which is ordinarily used by the Cunard steamers. The Scotch coal, on the other hand, is of so small a gravity and so smoky, that with the draft in the **Persia's** furnaces great volumes of smoke and unconsumed coals were drawn into funnels, and there ignited. The fact must have caused no little surprise to those who saw the vessel steaming down the channel, with the

jets of flame shooting from her chimneys from time to time, and with her great speed. The only thing we could compare her to was some leviathan who had run away with two Scotch lighthouses, and who was bearing his flaming thefts down the channel with panting strides, as though the Lord Provost of Glasgow with all the police were pursuing him.

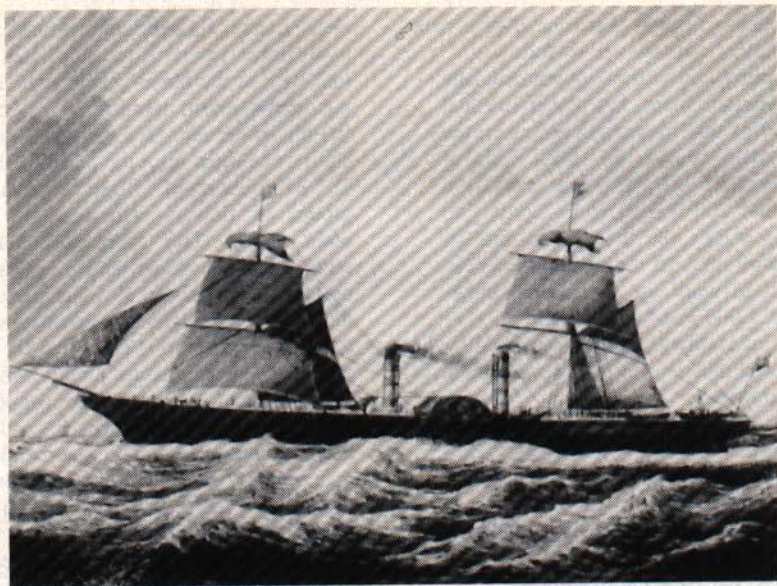
The **Persia** was about twenty-five percent larger than the **Arabia**, being:

Length between perpendiculars	360 ft.
Length overall	390 ft.
Breadth of hull	45 ft.
Breadth over paddleboxes	71 ft.

Gross tonnage	3,608 tons

She was rigged as a barque and carried enough canvas to have sailed across the Atlantic; her main yard was 76 feet long. There was a figurehead of a half-length Persian maiden, "with musical instruments and other articles of female occupation". The stern was elliptical and covered with gilt, while the paddleboxes had some gilt and a central carving of a lion springing from between two palm trees.

Being the first large iron hull, considerable constructional detail was provided:

The keel is 13 inches deep and 4½ inches thick; scarfed in lengths of 35 feet, and a rabbit in the keel for the garboard streak to lay into. The sternpost is 13 inches broad and 5 inches thick. The rudder stock is 8 inches in diameter. The framing of the ship is of angle iron, placed normally to the stem, at intervals of 18 inches from centre to centre amidships, and 20 inches centre to centre about five feet before and abaft the engine-room bulkheads. Amidships these ribs are 10 inches deep, with double angle iron riveted to each edge, so at present in section the appearance of a letter H placed sideways, thus, **I**. The **Persia** is divided into seven watertight apartments; and a novelty has been introduced into her framing forward which, in the bow compartment, is laid diagonally with a view of bearing a collision, should it ever occur, in the strongest arrange-



ment of the structure. The vessel is plated in and out alternately, in accordance with the present custom of building iron ships. The keel plates are $1\frac{1}{16}$ of an inch in thickness; from this section to the load water line they are $\frac{3}{4}$ of an inch; and above this they are $\frac{1}{16}$ ths of an inch in thickness. The plates round the gunwale are $\frac{7}{8}$ of an inch in thickness.

It was provided with watertight compartments, so that freight could be stowed in separate ones, each about 71 feet long, 16 feet wide and 20 feet deep. These gave considerable flotation capacity in the event of an accident.

The boilers, which are tubular, are placed in two groups, fore and aft, and they are fired amidships. It may also be stated that the ship has been so planned that the weight borne will be placed on lines parallel to the keel. The coal-bunkers are placed beyond the boilers at each extremity of the engine-room. Each boiler has five furnaces, and they are so independent that any one of them can be shut off should it not be required. In one particular the Persia differs from the Arabia, the steamer which came last on the line, namely, having smaller boilers, but a greater number of them, so as to enable the engineer to follow up the strokes of the engine with a longer pressure of steam. There are besides two donkey boilers and engines for pumping the feed water into the boilers; and in connection with them are eight refrigerators for abstracting the waste heat from the brine as it is blown off from the boilers, to heat the feed water. As there was no standard method of cal-

culating horsepower at that time, Napier, the engine builder, was quoted as follows:

According to the strict government rule of admeasurement, her power is equal to that of 900 horses; according to the plan laid down in the Earl of Hardwicke's bill, her power is equal to that of 1,200 horses; and according to James Watt's old established rule of 33,000 ft. lbs. to the horse, she is expected to work up to the pith of between 4,000 and 5,000 horses.

The Earl of Hardwicke's bill was used in the following comparison of the development of the Cunard fleet:

Substantially, this company has enlarged the size and power of its steamers, six times since the Unicorn went out, as follows:

First, the Britannia, Acadia, Caledonia, Columbia.

Second, the Hibernia, Cambria.

Third, the America, Europa, Niagara, Canada.

Fourth, the Asia, Africa.

Fifth, La Plata, Arabia.

Sixth, the Persia.

These vessels may be classified thus;

The four first, of 1200 tons and 440 horse-power each.

The Hibernia and Cambria, of 1,500 tons and 600 horse-power each.

The America and the vessels named with her, 1,840 tons and 700 horse-power each.

The Asia and Africa, 2,500 tons and 800 horse-power each.

La Plata and Arabia, 2,393 tons and 1,000 horse-power each.

The Persia, 3,600 tons and 1,200 horse power.

The news story in the *Halifax Nova Scotian*, which provided much of the information about the *Persia* contained in the first part of this article, continued with the following:

From the engine-room to the cabin is a short transition. Here are accommodations for 200 passengers, who will sleep in berths on one deck. There is a passage all round the ship below the main deck, so that no passenger will need to come on deck to get to or from his berth. On the same deck is an

elegant cabin for gentlemen who desire to sit in the centre of the ship, and adjoining it is the ladies' cabin, which is a gorgeous room, upholstered in a style fit for a Queen, and adorned with choice paintings from the pencil of Mr. D. M'Calman of Glasgow, whose groups of flowers also decorate the main saloon. This cabin is panelled with bird's-eye maple, and it is heated by steam, as are also all other parts of the ship. The height between decks in this part of the ship is eight feet six inches, and the berths are amply lighted and ventilated. The berths are supplied with the usual conveniences; and it may be mentioned that there are no less than twenty water closets in various parts of the lower deck. On the upper deck are the main and fore saloons, the officers' berths, and other accommodations. At the extreme afterend of the ship is a large smoking room, with cabins for the captain and chief officer, from which they may see the entire working of the ship. Next to these is the main saloon, which is 60 feet long, 20 feet wide, and 8 feet high. This saloon will dine about 170 persons. It is panelled in bird's-eye maple, with twisted pilasters, and neatly gilt trim and ceiling. The upholstery is red velvet, with red satin window curtains, embroidered in gold. The panels are filled with floral paintings, similar to the ladies' cabin. Elegantly framed mirrors are placed at the fore-end of the saloon as in the other vessels of the line, but at the after-end, a difference has been made by the introduction of two beautiful book-cases, and massive folding doors which open into the smoking room. The skylight is filled with stained glass, the prominent features being a Persian and a Persian woman in their native costume. Forward of the saloon are the kitchen and pantry, each of which has an area of 3000 feet, the floors of which are beautifully laid with tiles. The fore saloon and the various storerooms and officers' apartments, are also placed on the main deck; while the crew are ac-

commodated in the topgallant forecastle.

We might enumerate the conveniences of the *Persia* to any extent; and to speak of her baker's and butcher's shops, her joiners and carpenter's workshops, her surgery, ice-houses, lamp-houses, bathroom, and similar arrangements. But it is not necessary to dwell upon these points, as the *Persia* carries within herself appliances of comfort excelling the first hotels in the country, and she possesses saloons which have not unfitly been compared to the apartments of a baronial residence. But perhaps an allusion to one part of her outfit will be more striking than mere description. The *Persia*, fitted out on the same scale as the other vessels of the line, will require 400 counterpanes, 1,200 blankets, 1,600 sheets, 800 pillow slips, 4,600 towels, and 400 tablecloths; all of which, or nearly so, would come into requisition on a current voyage.

The summit of the saloons and officers' messrooms forms a hurricane deck, well railed, on which there is an

uninterrupted promenade of 370 feet in length, and of proportional width. This deck will form the passengers' promenade, and it will be very seldom that it cannot be used as a dry and comfortable place for walking.

The Persia has two sets of double-steering wheels, so that she can be steered either aft or amidships, as circumstances may require.

The crew of the ship will be made up as follows:

Engineers' Department: Engineers, 8; firemen, 54. **Stewards' Department:** Cooks, 8; stewards, 36. **Sailing Department:** Officers, 6; able-bodied seamen, 54; doctor, 1; purser, 1; carpenter, 1; joiner, 1. Total 170.

The Persia will accommodate 260 passengers and carry 1,200 tons of measurement goods, and 1,400 tons of coal, at a draft of 18 feet. The weight of herself, cargo, and stores being then 5,400 tons.

Here we close our description. But taking the *Persia* altogether, it must be confessed that she is the finest ship af-

loat. Indeed, no other builder has had a chance to produce anything like her. What can be done by others is one thing, what has been done by Mr. Napier is another. As yet, the *Persia* is unrivalled, and we should think that thousands of persons who have been down to the Huskison Graving Dock to see her as she there lay dry would be unanimous in the admiration of her beautiful bow and her graceful lines.

What her passage across the Atlantic may be it is as yet impossible to suppose. We are sanguine enough about her future performance, but it must be borne in mind that to cross the Atlantic in one day less than the powerful steamers on the line have it is a great achievement, equal to an increased speed of ten per cent.

The news report concluded with the statement that the next ship for the line will be called the *India*. This was not the case, for the next ship to be built for the Atlantic run was the only other iron paddlewheeler, the *Scotia*, which entered the service in 1862. She was also built by Napier and was slightly larger than the *Persia*, being rated at 3,871 tons.

Mid-winter is not the time to undertake the maiden voyage of a rather special ship. However, the *Persia* was ready, and took the *Arabia's* place on the New York run in late January 1856, sharing the route with the *Asia* and *Africa*. The difficulties encountered on this passage are worthy of being reported in the words of the news report of the time.

She left Liverpool at 12:22 on Saturday, Jan. 26, arrived at her dock in Jersey City at 11:30 on the 10th inst., making the passage through stormy weather, high seas, and much ice, in fourteen days, three hours, and fifty-four minutes, including the variation of time between the two points. On Tuesday, after leaving Liverpool, she was caught in a gale which amounted to a perfect hurricane. On the edge of the Banks she met with great obstructions from ice, was considerably damaged as to her paddlewheels, resulting in a detention of thirty hours, and a deviation from her direct course of 150 miles.

The draught of water on leaving Liverpool was, forward 23 feet 3 in.; aft 22 feet 11 in. The 27th opened with squally weather; at 2 the Suskas light was abeam; at 6:30 the Mine head light

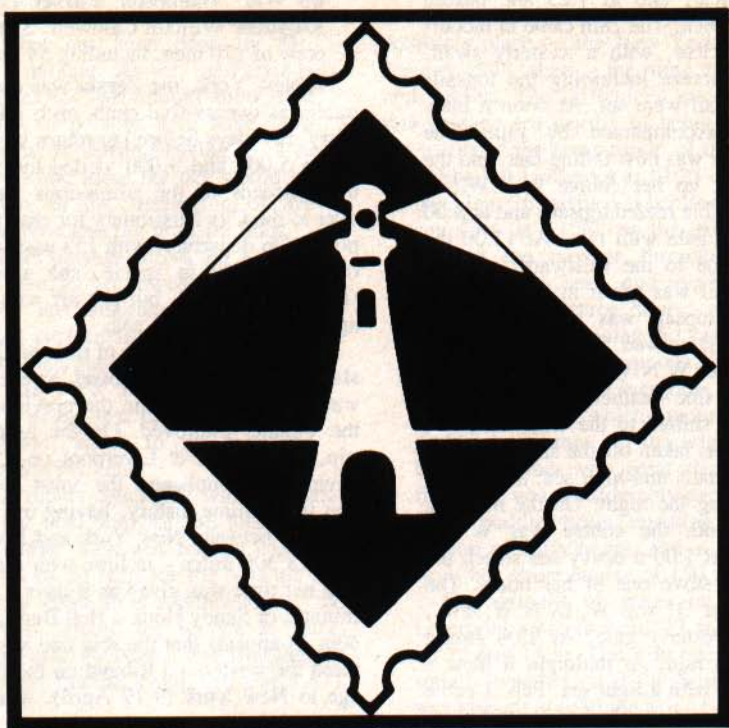
was abeam; at 1:12 she was abreast of Cape Clear, and at 1:25 she passed Fasnett Rock. The 28th came in moderate and clear, with a westerly swell, but the breeze increasing the topsails and foresail were set. At noon it blew a gale accompanied by rain. The barometer was now falling fast, and the ship took up her course W.N.W.; at 12:04 double reefed topsail, and at 8:00 it blew a gale with rain. At 11:00 the wind came to the westward, and the square sail was taken in; shortly after the maintopsail was stowed, and at midnight it snowed. The 29th found the ship on her W.N.W. course with moderate and fine weather. At 10½ o'clock the wind shifted to the westward, and all sail was taken off the ship. At noon heavy squalls and high sea; and a hard gale during the night. On the morning of the 30th the course was W. by N.½N. At 1:00 a heavy sea struck the ship and stove one of her boats. The course Jan. 31 was W. by N.W.½W., with a westerly gale. At 2:00 strong gales and rain. At midnight it blew a hard gale with a light sea. Feb. 1 came on with a strong gale and much lightning, course W. by N.½W., with S.W. wind, which shifted at 1:00 to S.S.W. The storm continued till 6:00, when hail fell, and the boats were secured. Much water was shipped during the day, the ship pitching very heavily. At midnight more moderate. Feb. 2 came in with wind W. by N. The course was W. by N.½W. with a fresh gale and hail at intervals. Noon strong gales and heavy sea. Several large fields of ice were encountered, and before her engines could be reversed ran into an iceberg which she cut through, leaving the remnants on either side of her — breaking off a majority of the floats and damaging almost the whole number of the arms, and entirely disabling the starboard wheel. Stopped engines and altered the course. The remainder of the passage was more or less stormy. **Persia's** officers are: **Captain** C.H.E. Judkins; **First Officer** William Kelly, **Second do** G.D. Han-

ley; **Third do** Robt. Shaw; **Fourth do** Wm. Thompson; **Purser** Dunlop; **Engineer** William Caldwell. She has a crew of 170 men, including 54 seamen.

At New York, the **Persia** was open to the public at twenty-five cents each on 18 February, two days before her return voyage. Between 5,000 and 8,000 visited the ship, and the proceeds of the admissions was turned over to the City Missionary for charitable purposes. On departure, with 153 passengers and over \$700,000 in specie, she grounded in Gedney's Channel, but got off without damage and proceeded to sea.

It was only a question of time until the **Persia** captured the Blue Riband, as each voyage was a little shorter than the previous one, as the weather improved. On the fourth return trip, she arrived at Liverpool on 15 August having "accomplished the most remarkable feat in maritime history, having traversed the distance between New York and Liverpool — about 3,300 miles — in little over nine days." The net time was given as 9 days 2 hours 40 minutes or Sandy Hook — Bell Buoy, 8d. 23h. 30m. It appears that the ship had already captured the westbound Riband on the third voyage to New York (9-19 April), when it was reported that her arrival marked the "shortest passage, homeward and outward, ever previously made." The record shows a westbound passage of 9d. 1hr. 45m. These records stood until the **Scotia** made trips in both directions under nine days in the mid-1860's.

The advent of large screw steamships, beginning with the **China** (2,529 tons) in 1862, marked the beginning of the end of the paddlewheelers. With the entry of the **Cuba** (1864), **Java** (1865) and the **Russia** (1867), the wooden paddlewheelers were disposed of, beginning with the **Arabia** (1864) and ending with the **Africa** (1867), and the **Persia** went the following year. The Halifax and Boston service was discontinued at the end of 1867 and the **Scotia**, with five screw steamships (the **Australasian**, built in 1857, joining the above four) maintained the New York service into the 1870's. □



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Philately in Wonderland

The appearance of a new publication in the tradition of Lewis Carroll called "Alice through the Pillar Box - A Philatelic Phantasy" by Gerald King (American Philatelist February 1983), brings to mind an earlier occasion when Alice was associated with philately.

The Wonderland Postage Stamp Case was the result of an idea which occurred to Lewis Carroll (Charles Lutwidge Dodgson) in late 1888 as a handy container for postage stamps. As can be seen from the illustration (Figure 1), it is in two parts - a folder with pockets for stamps and a slip-in case.

Both the case and the folder are decorated in colour with Tenniel's illustrations based upon those in "Alice in Wonderland". It is apparent that the case was designed to hold a set of the then current

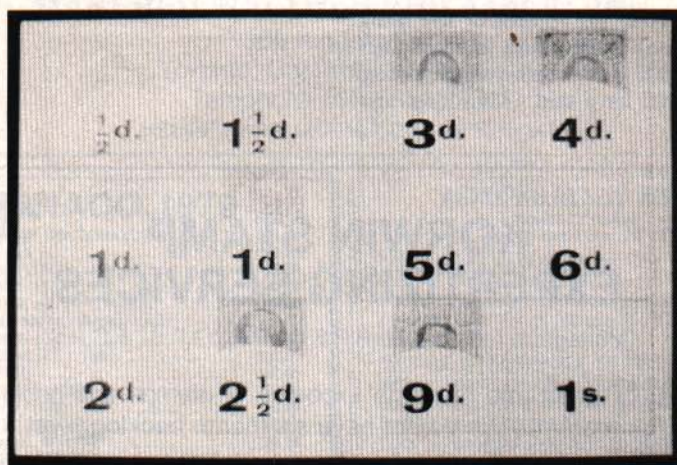


Figure 2. The stamp case folder opened out to show the stamp pockets. Some of the Great Britain 1887 Jubilee issue it was designed to contain are shown in the appropriate pockets.

Jubilee issue (Scott 88, 111 to 122). There is no printed pocket for a 10 penny value as this stamp did not appear until February 1890 - too late to be included in the design which went on sale in July 1890 (Figure 2).

The Postage Stamp Case was accompanied by a small booklet written by Lewis Carroll entitled "Eight or Nine Wise Words About Letter Writing". In the booklet Carroll recommends placing six stamps in each pocket and comments that he seldom found a need for the 5 penny, 9 penny or 1 shilling stamps (a fact reflected in current catalogue values). There are sections on how to begin a letter, how to go on with a letter and how to end a letter and a very complex record system for correspondence. Carroll himself apparently kept such a record of all his letters between 1861 and 1898.

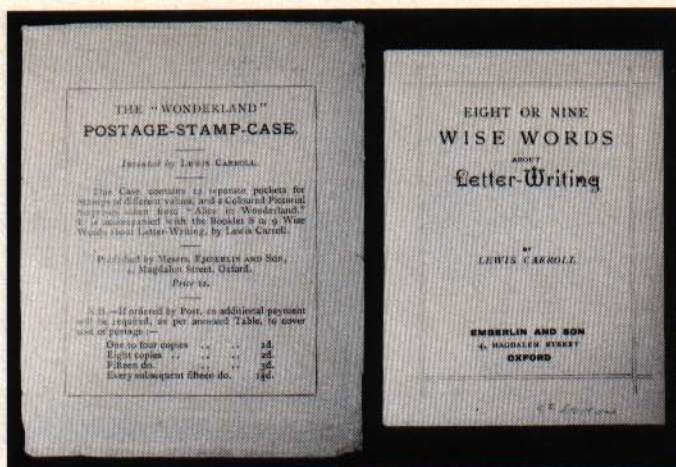


Figure 3. The covering envelope (3rd edition) in which the set was sold and the booklet "Eight or Nine Wise Words about Letter Writing" (8th edition).

Both the case and the booklet were sold in a rather flimsy envelope (Figure 3) imprinted with prices for quantities. Ephemera and Lewis Carroll collectors usually attempt to collect these items in the editions in which they were issued.

The case and the covering envelope were printed in three editions which show only

minor variations. The booklet was issued in eight editions and it is possible that some editions were distributed separately. Carroll regularly donated copies of his works to hospitals and charities.

The sets could still be purchased at the original price from the publisher until the early years of World War II, but are now

quite scarce. There are records of sets being offered by book dealers and in some auctions in the 1930's at extremely high prices. As Alice would have said - Curiouser and curiouser! ☐

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Opal Booklet Vending Machine Items

The Opal Manufacturing Company Limited of Toronto, has supplied the Canada Post Office with postage stamp vending machines since 1955. The operation of privately-owned stamp vending machines was common practice under Post Office regulations as their convenience proved attractive to hotels and retail businesses (and their customers) and was a useful supplement to postal service outlets. In 1970 Canada Post authorized the Opal Manufacturing Company to vend through their own privately maintained vending machines in Toronto, a specially-prepared 20¢ postage stamp booklet that sold for 25¢. This booklet contained a pane arrangement of four 2¢ Centennial stamps and four 3¢ Centennial stamps with a blank gutter in-between (a pane arrangement that did not exist in any other official booklet of the Centennial issue). The booklets were printed by the Canadian Bank Note Company, Ottawa, using new printing plates prepared from the original engraved dies. The stamps were printed in sheet form and line perforated 12 on a coated, hi-brite paper, not found on any of the sheet values (or any other booklets) of the Centennial issue.

The original format of the booklet pane included perforations through the folded centre gutter. Approximately 225,000 of the total 2,200,000 booklets printed appeared with the horizontal perforations along the centre fold. However, it was felt that these horizontal perforations through the gutter were unnecessary and they were discontinued. Figure 1 shows

both the horizontally-perforated gutter (right) and the more common unperforated gutter (left). Although a very large quantity of booklets was prepared with horizontal perforations through the gutter, many faked examples of this variety have appeared on the philatelic market and figure 2 shows two faked booklets.

The covers for these booklets (figure 3) were pre-printed in large sheets and rouletted on the fold. The individual panes were attached to the inside of the booklet cover by a selvage strip while the booklets were held closed by spot gumming (normal booklets have the pane attached to the inside of the front cover; a variety exists where the pane is attached to the back cover). The booklets were delivered in a criss-cross fashion in lots of 50 for insertion into the Opal vending machines. The stamps were purchased by the Opal Company from Canada Post at face value. These booklets were issued on October 26, 1970.

The vending machines for private use were identical to the machines used by the Canada Post Office throughout Canada, except for the colour of the cabinet and the design of the instruction plate. Some of these private vending machines were sold to store owners while Opal Manufacturing Company leased out additional vending machines during 1970 and 1971. This leasing programme was discontinued and the machines were returned to the Opal Company.

Changes in regulations regarding the sale of postage stamps through privately owned stamp vending machines were announced by the Postmaster General on March 20, 1972. Under the new regulations, permits would only be issued if the stamps were sold at face value. The Post Office Department allowed a 5% discount to the permit holder or agent on purchases of \$50 and over. The Opal Manufacturing Company's supply of 20¢ booklets became depleted in 1972. The machine operators who already had permits for vending machines prior to March of 1972 were given a choice: they could either apply to

Canada Post for a permit to purchase the official Post Office 25¢ booklets or they could purchase envelopes from the Opal Company and fill them with sheet stamps purchased by the machine operators from a local post office.

In the summer of 1972, a plain manila envelope, the same size as a sealed booklet, appeared in some vending machines. These envelopes were dispensed for 25¢ and contained Centennial sheet stamps at a face value of 20¢. These plain manila envelopes are shown in figure 4.

Some operators chose to prepare cardboard folders containing postage stamps with a face value of 20¢ to be dispensed from private vending machines. Figure 5 shows a buff-colored cardboard folder enclosing two 8¢ Centennial definitives and one 4¢ Centennial definitive. The stamps were loose inside the folder, which was held closed by a staple and a rubber stamp was used to print the contents in green ink on the front cover.

Manila envelopes with advertising on the front appeared in November 1973 in some

Opal vending machines (figure 6). The envelopes with advertising were made up for one vending machine operator but upon the death of this operator, the Opal Manufacturing Company purchased the remainder of these envelopes and distributed them (it is interesting to note that the address on the envelopes for Multiple Housing Services is that of the Opal Manufacturing Company).

The Centennial definitives were replaced by the Caricature definitives late in 1973. As post office stock of Centennial stamps became

depleted, Caricature definitives began to appear in these advertising envelopes early in 1974 (figure 7). In August 1974, the Opal Manufacturing Company began supplying plain white envelopes to the operators of vending machines. These envelopes (figure 8) were filled with Caricature definitives, marking the end of Centennial stamps being dispensed from Opal vending machines.

Information on envelopes used by the Opal Manufacturing Company was graciously supplied by Guenter Jansen. Various articles on Opal booklets have appeared in BNA TOPICS and the newsletter of the BNAPS Centennial Definitives Study Group. □

In the last column the difficulty of colour identification was mentioned. We now hear that a computer-based system takes only seconds to measure and match colours. The Colour Match Prediction System can rapidly and accurately assess the colour by use of a reflectance spectrophotometer, a disc storage mini-computer, a visual display unit and a keyboard printer. Instrumental Colour System in England is manufacturing this. It certainly would be far too expensive for a collector or most dealers, but manufacturers of postage stamps may benefit greatly and save between 10 and 50% on colourant costs.

An interesting comment on listing single stamps from booklets. What must be regarded as THE German Specialized catalogue, Michel, and the most widely used in Europe and for any specialists on this side of the ocean, lists no prices for any single stamps from booklets. Translated it says, "Prices apply only for booklet panes". Single stamps from booklets are regarded as damaged.

Two new books may soon come on the market. One of them will deal with the constant plate flaws of the Admiral stamps. Flaws are not covered in the extensive research study by Marler. The book is to be well-illustrated to show all the flaws. The other book will be the Canadian Postage Due Stamps, a subject long overdue. A vast amount of new information has been collected and for the first time it will disclose and illustrate a set which has been prepared but was not issued. Extensive illustrations will show various uses.

The question of whether a collector should educate a dealer has often been discussed. Most dealers are not experts on all issues and only have a good general knowledge. Collectors have often very specialized knowledge and make use of this when buying from a general dealer. They may purchase a special

stamp at a regular price without the dealer being aware of selling a more valuable stamp at a regular price. There is nothing illegal about this and it is a nice find for the collector. The same collector though, may complain to the dealer that he does not keep for him stamps for his very specialized collection, or that he does not sort out items from his stock for him, or that he charges wrong prices for certain stamps. That all may be true, but who is to be blamed? If the collector does not educate the dealer to some extent, the collector will never get what he wants. This does not mean that every dealer must become a specialist or a collector must make his dealer an expert, but often the fundamentals are not understood by dealers and that can cause problems. The reason this question is raised here, is an incident which occurred just one month ago. A collector wanted to sell his collection. The collector was not a specialist. The majority of the stamps purchased came from two known dealers. There were 50¢ Admirals marked as black, which were the cheaper dry printing, there were many Small Queens marked as Montreal early printings, which were late Ottawa printings, there were Large Queens marked as 11½ by 12, which were 12 by 12, there was a so-called No. 1 which was a No. 4, and on and on. When told that the collection was worth much less than stated, the collector pointed out most stamps came from a reputable dealer. Reputable maybe, but without basic knowledge, obviously. Therefore, knowledge by dealers and collectors can only improve the relationship between the two parties.

Official Catalogue of Canada Precancels

There can be no doubt that over the past few years, Canadian precancels have increased in collecting popularity. Not only

have such stamps been sold by dealers, but they have appeared more frequently in major auctions. Prices have reflected this interest and many new finds have been made. Mr. H.G. Walburn, editor of this catalogue for many years, continues to be the main source of information for Canadian precancels. Not only does he own probably the most complete collection, but his historical memory of many important facts allows him to represent a very accurate picture of this philatelic facet. Now a new edition, the fourteenth, has been prepared by him to make this catalogue an updated version of the previous one. Two facts can be noted when reviewing this new catalogue. The first is that a large number of new finds have been recorded, so that the total possible precancels must be around 3,600. One of them is the Perth 1¢ Green Arch issue, 1930, Die II, with the Money Order number 4030, which can be confused with 4530 Toronto. The second one is that the prices better reflect the actual market, since the majority of sales and buys are made in accordance with the prices quoted in this catalogue. With almost sixty pages of information, it is amazing that the catalogue costs only \$4.00 in Canada. It is available from all dealers and distributors, as well as from Mr. Walburn. A valuable edition to philatelic literature and a must for all. □

RECENT ISSUES



September 16, 1983

Two 30¢ commemoratives honouring historical figures Josiah Henson and Antoine Labelle were issued on 16 September.

Josiah Henson was born in Maryland, the son of a slave. A fervent Christian since youth, he was ordained a preacher by the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1828 and two years later escaped to Canada with his two young children. He co-founded a settlement and school for blacks near Dresden, Ontario and acted as leader for other escaped slaves.

Toronto artist Tony Kew has based his stamp design on a portrait of Henson against a symbolic rendition of the "underground railway" which transported slaves to freedom in Canada.

François-Xavier Antoine Labelle was born at Ste-Rose in Laval county and was ordained a priest in 1856. Curé Labelle was instrumental in establishing the "Société de la colonisation" which encouraged settlement as far as Manitoba. His parish work led to his being named deputy minister for settlement and in 1889 he became a Monsignor.

Quebec illustrator Jacques Hamel has rendered the portrait of Labelle flanked by his colonists, their cleared land, and the "petit train du nord", which linked settlements to Montreal and the south.

Both stamps were printed by British American Bank Note in four-colour lithography in quantities of 20 million each. The paper stock is listed as coated one side, litho (Clark).

October 3, 1983

The first in a continuing series featuring Canadian locomotives was issued on 3 October. The series is expected to continue into the mid-1980's to mark the centennial of "The Last Spike" and the 150th anniversary of the first Canadian railway.

The first Canadian railroad, the Champlain and St. Lawrence, was inaugurated on 21 July 1836. The *Dorchester*, a locomotive imported from England pulled two coaches from La Prairie to Dorchester and back. In 1838 the *Samson*, the first locomotive in the Maritimes, began running from the Froid coal mine to the Pictou wharf.

The 1850's and 1860's were boom-years for Canadian railroads, with 2065 miles of track by 1860. However, most locomotives such as the Birkenhead-type *Adam Brown* were still imported. Among the first manufactured locally was the *Toronto*, the first manufactured in Canada West, built in Toronto in 1853.



The four stamps were designed by Ernst Roch of Montreal. According to official reports, the design format is ideal for presenting the mechanical complexity that makes locomotives so visually interesting. Unfortunately the designs sadly lack the visual impact achieved during the earlier aircraft series and the stamps look like they are depicting cheap little plastic models.

The 32¢ stamps were printed se-tenant in panes of 25 stamps in a quantity of 18 million, while the 37¢ stamp was issued in a quantity of 8.6 million and the 64¢ in 8.2 million, both in panes of 25. They were printed by Ashton-Potter using six-colour lithography on British Harrison paper, general tagged, perf. 13.

In addition to the stamps, the Post Office released a set of postcards depicting the designs and also a Souvenir Stamp Pack similar to the aircraft ones.

October 28, 1983

The 100th anniversary of the Dalhousie Law School was marked with the release of a single 32¢ commemorative featuring the school coat-of-arms: the phoenix over the traditional symbols of justice.

The Dalhousie Law School is the oldest continually operating university common-law school in Canada. Its original goal was to pro-

duce practical as well as theoretical lawyers, a radical approach away from the strictly apprenticeship method. The idea flourished and is now the standard throughout Canada.



The stamp was designed by Denise Saulnier based on a photograph by Don Robinson. The 18 million stamps were printed by Canadian Bank Note using five-colour lithography on British Harrison paper in panes of 50, general tagged and perf. 13.

1984 STAMP PROGRAM

Another new record was set when André Oulet announced the 1984 stamp program on 12 August. The announced program is totally devoid of denominations except for the \$1 Glacier National Park definitive being issued to replace the \$1 Fundy. No explanation is given why the Fundy is being replaced except as we know to fill the philatelic sales coffers.

Although no denominations are given, it is expected that under the government's "6 and 5" program, postal rates will rise 5% during the early part of the year. This is undoubtedly why the stamp program commences on 15 March, to allow sufficient time to release new definitives, coils, booklets, etc. The new postage rates will probably be: 34¢, 39¢ and 67¢ respectively.

One of the big disappointments of the program is that after an attractive and innovative Canada Day Forts booklet for 1983, it was announced that 1984 would see another 12-stamp miniature sheet on some Canadian artist's conception of Canada's provinces and territories. Success must scare philatelic officials so they've gone back to drivel! □

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Literature Reviews

CANADIAN STAMP HANDBOOKS EDITED BY MICHAEL MILOS. THE CENTENNIALS 1967-1973. Published by the Unitrade Press, 127 Cartwright Ave., Toronto, Ontario M6A 1V4. 15.5 cm x 23 cm, 44 pages, loose-leaf, 3-hole punched, 1983. \$5.95.

The Centennials handbook, second in this on-going series, was prepared by Richard Fournier, Murray Freedman, Peter Harris, Douglas Irwin and Ken Rose.

This most popular of Elizabethan series contains much technical information separated into three main paper types, format, imprints, gum, perforations, tagging arrangements, precancels, dies and printing methods. Pricing is included for mint and used single stamps, plate blocks, warning strips of 20, and first day covers. Stamps issued only in booklet panes are listed and priced separately as are all complete booklets.

There are four pages illustrating varieties at the end of the handbook. This 44-page handbook is useful but awkward. The printers have used two paper stocks for no apparent reason, and the publishers forgot to number the pages which would have proven helpful for a loose-leaf effort. Since this handbook was produced on the "cheap" side, it remains a mystery why it is priced at \$5.95 rather than say \$2.95.

STANLEY GIBBONS 1984 STAMP CATALOGUE, PART 1, BRITISH COMMONWEALTH. Published by Stanley Gibbons Publications Ltd., 399 Strand, London, England WC2R 0LX. 21.3 cm x 30.4 cm, approx. 830 pages, hard bound, 1983. £15.95 or equivalent.

Preface notes are optimistic that stamp collecting has come of age and that stability has been established with the hobby stronger than for many years.

As is customary with all new editions of

S.G. catalogues, many areas have been expanded, revised and updated. Examples include the detailed "Used Abroad" being extended to a number of additional territories, a drastic reappraisal of the Penny Red plate number prices, the use of Indian stamps in the Persian Gulf states, a reunited listing for Maldivian Islands, and a listing of the cachets used on Tristan da Cunha before the introduction of stamps in 1952. In addition, prices have been revised throughout.

For those collectors who appreciate quality and can afford the North American price difference, this catalogue is vastly superior to the similar Scott Volume 1.

STANLEY GIBBONS SIMPLIFIED CATALOGUE, STAMPS OF THE WORLD, 1984 EDITION, Volume 1, Countries A-J. Published by Stanley Gibbons Publications Ltd., 399 Strand, London, England WC2R 0LX. 21.3 cm x 30.4 cm, 992 pages, soft bound, 1983. £11.50 or equivalent.

There is probably little that hasn't already been written about this catalogue which has become something of a philatelic institution since first published in 1934 as a single volume.

Over 3800 stamps and nearly 1100 illustrations have been added to this volume since the 1983 edition and combined with Volume 2 due out shortly, the catalogue lists over 230,000 stamps with more than 52,000 illustrations. No wonder worldwide collectors are a dying breed!

However, this catalogue serves a basic need for the ever-popular topical collecting as it comprises a complete listing of all basic stamps issued since 1840.

BRITISH COLUMBIA POST OFFICES, Edited by William Topping. Published by the author, 7430 Angus Drive, Vancouver,

B.C. V6P 5K2. 15.3 cm x 23 cm, paper back, 72 pages, 1983. \$8.00 Canadian.

This is the first in a series of checklists of the post offices of Western Canada, the Yukon and the Northwest Territories. This checklist of B.C. post offices provides an up-to-date listing of all recorded post offices established in British Columbia since 1871. Each office has been assigned an identification code and the listings include that code, name of office, any change of status, date established, date closed (if applicable), type of cancellations used, physical locations and a cancellation rarity factor.

This is an excellent reference source for those interested in the postal history of British Columbia and certainly a labour of love by the author to have taken the time to compile such a complete listing.

THE STAMP JOURNALS INDEX 1979, Compiled by Lawrence C. Schwartz. Published by The Stamp Journals Index Co., 177 Columbia Heights, Brooklyn, N.Y. 11201. 21 cm x 27.3 cm, 139 pages, soft bound, 1983. \$22.95

The annual series of the Stamp Journals Index is a country and subject index to selected articles in 35 stamp periodicals published in English. The Canadian Philatelist is included as one of the selected periodicals.

This is a highly useful index listing for budding authors and for all philatelic researchers looking for published material on their particular speciality. When you see the volume of work included, you can appreciate why it took four years to publish the 1979 listings.

THE SEMI-OFFICIAL AIR STAMPS OF CANADA 1924-1934, by C.A. Longworth-Dames. 108 pp. Published 1982 by the author. U.S. \$10.00.

This is a well written, well presented book which provides all of the known information on the early semi-official air mail services in Canada. There is a short one or two page history of each of the air services, starting with the Laurentide Air Service Limited in April 1924, when it started the first regular passenger air route in Canada from its base at Angliers, Quebec into the Rouyn Goldfields.

Immediately following each historical sum-

mary are photos of the aircraft, and a list of the aircraft used by the operator, and then all known details of the semi-official stamps. This is followed by a listing of the flights of that particular air service.

The book concludes with Canadian Airways Limited, which operated between 1932 and 1934. There is also a bibliography of all the references the author consulted. The semi-official scheme lasted for eleven years, during which time the thirteen companies involved issued a total of 40 different stamps. Here brought together for the first time in one book, is the full story of these early airmail flights, which were the pioneer airlines of Canada.

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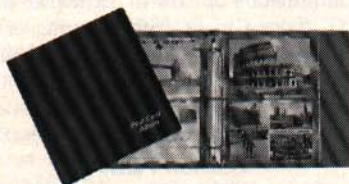
